Flu FAQ with Hospital Epidemiologist August Valenti, MD



Every year, we receive a lot of questions about the severity of the flu season and the best ways to protect yourself. Maine Medical Center's care teams receive regular updates from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) about the flu and follow evidence-based protocols to prevent spread of the disease. Maine Medical Center's Hospital Epidemiologist, August Valenti, MD, answers some of our most frequently asked questions about this year's flu season and vaccines.

When does flu season start?

The 2018-2019 influenza season officially began on Sept. 30. The Maine CDC is recommending everyone over the age of 6 months be vaccinated against the flu before the end of October, as influenza is already present in the state. Is this year's flu vaccine effective?

The effectiveness of the flu vaccine varies from year to year, but vaccination is always your best defense against flu. This year's vaccine protects against four different strains of the virus. There may be other strains of influenza that will circulate, and no vaccine is 100 percent effective. But vaccination can both prevent the flu and reduce its severity.

Where do I get a flu shot?

Most people can get a flu shot through their primary care provider. Flu shots are currently available at all Maine Medical Partners primary care offices and pediatric clinics. Many pharmacies also provide flu shots to adults, though MMC's hospital pharmacy does not.

I've heard there are a few different kinds of vaccines? How do I know which one I should get?

Most people will receive what's known as a quadrivalent vaccine, meaning it protects against four types of flu. Those 65 and older may receive a high-dose trivalent vaccine instead. The higher dose may do a better job protecting seniors. If you are over the age of 65, we encourage you to talk to your doctor about which flu shot is the best one for you.

The CDC has approved both a nasal vaccine and an injectable vaccine for children this year. Last year a nasal vaccine was not available. In general, Maine Medical Center pediatricians recommend the injection, but parents should talk to their child's pediatrician to determine what is best for their family.
