Pediatric Intensive Care Unit Moving to BBCH Inpatient Unit

MMC's Pediatric Intensive Care Unit (PICU) at The Barbara Bush Children's Hospital (BBCH) will be relocating to the 6th floor of the Bean Building, the current BBCH inpatient unit. The new PICU is slated to open January 2016.

Featuring eight rooms, the new unit will be one of the most sophisticated facilities for pediatric critical care in the northeast. The spacious, private rooms will have large windows, providing a more comfortable environment for family members

who are dealing with very serious issues.

The PICU at BBCH is Maine's largest and most comprehensive pediatric critical care unit. Patients are transported here for care from all over the state and parts of New Hampshire. The PICU cares for more than 450 critically ill children from birth to age 21 each year.

"Relocating the PICU will provide continuity of care for both patients and their families when making the

transition to the inpatient unit," says Zander Abbott, Vice President, Women and Children Service Line.

"They will also have access to all of the amenities and services of the inpatient unit, such as the family room, atrium, and daily activities and events."

PICU doctors and nurses are specially trained in pediatric critical care medicine with the expertise to care for our smallest and most critically ill patients. This includes advanced therapies Nurse Manager. such as ventilation

(mechanical breathing support), sophisticated monitoring techniques, and administering certain medications that can be given only under close medical supervision. The nurse-to-patient ratio is higher than the general pediatric unit to ensure constant monitoring and care.

New PAPR Training Coming Soon

MMC is replacing all of its current Power Air Purifying Respirator (PAPR) devices with the new 3M Versa-Flow PAPR. The new PAPRs are expected to be in use June 1. The new device is a significant upgrade from the current 3M Air-Mate model. Hood connections, hose connections, battery inspections, flow checks, and warning functions have all been added or modified.

Anyone currently trained to use PAPR must attend a 30-minute training session to learn how to use the new devices. Trainings take place throughout April. Sign up through Lawson.





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
