MMC's Cardiovascular Institute, composed of experienced caregivers from our MMP - MaineHealth Cardi-

uously putting patients and fami-racic Surgery, MMP - Surgilies first by investing in our three- cal Care practices, and Congenital Heart program, has a long history of "firsts" in Maine. From the first heart transplant in 1959, to the first trans-catheter aortic valve replacement (TAVR) in 2012, they have always provided leading-edge cardiovascular care. Boardcertified, fellowship-trained cardiologists and cardiothoracic surgeons, together with a Magnet Awardwinning nursing staff, care for more people with heart disease than any other hospital in Maine. A large patient volume has led to vast experience and the knowledge to tailor the best

personal care to each patient.

The depth of the clinical cardiovascular programs at MMC is impressive, including:

- The MitraClip program for mitral valve repairs.
- An advanced heartfailure program, including an Extracorporeal Membrane Operation (ECMO) and ventricular assist device (VAD) program coming this fall.
- An advanced cardiac electrophysiology program with a focus on the treatment of atrial

fibrillation.

A strong pediatric/ congenital cardiology and cardiac surgery program that accounts for more than 80 percent of such patients treated in Maine.

In addition, MMC is the only hospital in the state performing TAVR. TAVR is a valuable option for patients with severe aortic stenosis (narrowing of the aortic valve), who are not candidates for open-heart surgical Aortic Valve Replacement (AVR). In TAVR, a new valve is implanted inside the patient's own
