"We deliver high quality care because we have a talented staff with broad expertise who integrate education and research into the clinical model, while providing leadership in hospital administration and medical education," says Mark Parker, M.D., Division Director of Nephrology.

MMC's Nephrology services include Maine's only transplant program, kidney stone prevention, dialysis/ plasmapheresis, and interventional nephrology (a subspecialty in which nephrologists perform diagnostic kidney injury. and other procedures nor-

In conjunction with a prominent fellowship, teaching, and research structure, Nephrology is exceeding national benchmarks and continually improving patient care.

MMC nephrology physicians are involved in education and research through the fellowship program, teaching medical students, and training residents. About 30 percent of MMC fellows have stayed on to practice in the state of Maine, fulfilling a core mission of MMC training programs. Dr. Parker is nationally recognized for his work in medical education and workforce assessment and is part of a national policy committee for fellowship oversight (Training Program Director, Executive Committee for American Society for Nephrology). The team is also involved in multiple research projects, including rehabilitation for dialysis patients led by James Wasserman, M.D., and work by Robert Zimmerman, M.D., in acute

The Maine Transplant Program (MTP) is the only transplant program in the state. Active since 1971, the program has excellent patient and graft survival rates when compared nationally. The program has introduced vigorous quality standards, reducing length of stay and readmission rates dramatically in recent vears.

In addition, the MTP has double the transplant rate and half the waiting time compared to the national average. This is in large part due to their "fast-track" process, which allows the team to work up candidates rapidly so they can be added to the waiting list as soon as possible.

The Kidney Stone Prevention Program at MMC, opened in 2013, is the first and only comprehensive prevention program of its

kind in New England. Under the direction of Eric Taylor, M.D., MSc, who is nationally recognized for his clinical work, and in close collaboration with MMC Urology, endocrinologists, pediatric nephrologists, and a dietician, the team works to identify the cause of the stones and to formulate an individualized, effective treatment plan to prevent kidney stone recurrence.
