## Maine's newest hospital marks fifth anniversary with near-record census & more

A 60-month period of incremental successes, culminating in the recent opening of a new hospital in Westbrook, was celebrated March 31 by the staff of southern Maine's only psychiatric treatment center. Now located at 123 Andover Road, the 100-bed Spring Harbor Hospital celebrates its fifth year of service to the community.

"It has been quite an amazing journey," says Spring Harbor CEO Dennis P. King, who also serves as immediate past president of the National Association of Psychiatric Healthcare Systems. "Five years ago, it was not possible for us to envision our future here in this beautiful new building because there were far too many more immediate needs facing us."

Since opening its doors earlier in March, the new Spring Harbor Hospital is seeing a near-record volume of patients. Occupancy has been in the 90-percent range for most of the month. "Though March is typically a high-census month," King notes, "since we opened our doors, census is definitely up, even above our typical seasonal highs."

Spring Harbor was established in March 1999. By the end of that year, the hospital's annual patient admissions stood at 1,300; by the conclusion of the following year, admissions had more than doubled, making Spring Harbor the most-visited psychiatric hospital in Maine.

Other successes soon followed, including the opening of a new 12-bed unit for adults, the creation of a single point of entry for the mental health programs of Spring Harbor and Maine Medical Center, two positive triennial

reviews by the Joint Commission on the Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations and the State's Bureau of Licensing, and continued increases in admissions.

"Our primary goal from the beginning was improving access to hospital care for people in need," says Spring Harbor Board Chairman Richard Aronson. Toward that end, Spring Harbor has successfully decreased average length of patient stays from 25 days in 1999 to 8 this year, which greatly increases the number of patients the hospital can serve.

Spring Harbor also has worked with its largest referral source, MMC's Emergency Department, to reduce wait time in the ED for patients in psychiatric crisis. Back in 2001, the ED wait time for learning whether a patient could be admitted to Spring Harbor averaged more than 12 hours. Improvements since then include a 59 percent decrease in average wait time in 2003, despite a 25 percent increase in psychiatric admissions each month between 2001 and 2003. The National Institute for Healthcare Improvement recently honored the hospital's efforts in reducing their wait time.

Among those who have witnessed the five-year evolution of Spring Harbor from fledgling new hospital to solid treatment and recovery center in a new therapeutic setting is Amy Juneau. A psychiatric nurse with thirteen years of service at Spring Harbor and its predecessor organization, Juneau says, "It is so gratifying to hear that patients are choosing to come to our hospital now, not only for our clinical expertise, but also because of our new, more patient-friendly care

## MMC Research Forum 2004 showcased advancements

MMC Research Forum 2004 showcased wide-ranging research performed throughout Maine Medical Center. Samantha Timmons, MD, won the award for best scientific oral presentation for "A pilot study of trauma screening in the Somali population in Portland, Maine." The \$1,000 first place award goes toward attendance at a scientific conference. The competitive plenary session featured residents, research fellows, graduate students, nurses, and others selected to represent the best research from each MMC department that participated.

This year's Forum "was the largest and most successful in the history of MMC" and involved "a very broad range of clinical and basic science participants" said Kenneth Ault, MD, Associate Vice President for Research and Director of Maine Medical Center Research Institute. Research topics were drawn from areas such as emergency medicine, obstetrics and gynecology, nursing, family practice, psychiatry, stem cell basic science research, radiology, anesthesia, and pediatrics.

This represented "an astounding variety of investigations" observed Carl Bredenberg, MD, Chief of Surgery, illustrating that "research is the creative part of our job. It deepens our understanding of our craft. It is a way to teach young trainees creative thinking, methodological rigor, and intellectual honesty."

Scientific investigators who often work behind the scenes were in the spotlight during the week of activities

We had a patient who virtually lived here on R5 for the last few months of his life. He recently died. His mom is elderly, quite frail, and pretty much alone in this world. She essentially stayed here on R5 whenever her son was admitted. Over the years she had come

to know many, many MMC staff folks. She viewed everyone here as her "family". Linda had befriended her and assisted her on many occasions with a variety of things ranging from something as simple as getting her a towel, to providing her with transportation outside for errands, helping her with her laundry, etc. Linda often came to simply sit with her for support whenever her son's condition worsened.

When it became apparent that the patient would soon die, Linda was the one who was able to calm and console this extremely distraught mom. And when he died around 1:30am on a Sunday, it was Linda who came in, gave her a ride home, and then came back here to MMC to work her regular shift.

It is people like Linda who exemplify the Customer Service Standards as developed from the Service at the Center endeavor. How fortunate we are here at MMC to see the respect standards being demonstrated in such a touching manner.

from Friday, April 2, through Thursday, April 8. The plenary session on the last day capped a week of 32 research presentations in Grand Rounds given in nine different departments throughout the hospital. The outstanding research talks at the plenary session were chosen from more than 60 abstracts submitted for consideration. A Poster Session on Thursday afternoon presented 42 research projects.

At the close of the plenary session, a panel of judges worked to choose the winner while the participants enjoyed a reception. Robert Friesel, PhD, Scientific Director of MMCRI, who served as one of the judges, commented that "the scientific papers were the best they have ever been! There were really outstanding basic and clinical scientific projects." He sees the Research Forum as encouraging more translational research and increasing collaborations between clinicians and basic scientists.

Dr. Timmons, a Fellow in the Department of Internal Medicine, performed the winning study. Her research uncovered a universal experience of trauma among the Somali patients she interviewed. Susan Swartz, MD, a co-chair of the Planning Committee, commended Dr. Timmons' work as "fascinating socially relevant research conducted in a rigorous and ethical way." These findings highlight the difficulties faced by MMC in delivering high quality healthcare to the diverse Portland community and may point the way to improving future care.

It took Dr. Timmons about two years to perform her study, starting with an idea during her second year as a resident in Internal Medicine. Her research was supported by a grant from the Maine Medical Center Research Committee and by mentoring from more experienced researchers, such as

Kathleen Fairfield, MD, DrPH, in the Center for Outcomes Research. Timmons said the results of her study have significance for all types of people who interact with immigrants in the southern Maine area, including police, aid workers for immigrants, mental health professionals, and medical care providers. She hopes getting the word out to many groups who work in crosscultural settings will raise awareness of the trauma that most Somali immigrants have experienced, so they can be supported and their needs can be better met.

Research Forum is planned to continue as an annual event to emphasize the importance of research as one of MMC's three central missions, and to encourage young researchers. Jan Trott, Director of the Office of Research Administration, and a cochair of this year's event, commented that "wonderful research is taking place at MMC and the level of professionalism is very high. The presenters should all be proud, as the scoring for the prize was very close."

# Laboratory professionals work with you for better health

You often hear: "We're waiting for lab results." You rarely get to the lab and only know the voice at the other end of the phone. Just who are these lab professionals?

The clinical laboratory is staffed by various categories of professionals. Medical technologists, medical laboratory technicians, cytotechnologists, histotechnologists, and histology technicians have the education and skills to unlock important medical information that is pivotal to the diagnosis, treatment, and prevention of disease. Phlebotomists and specimen processors are trained in the very important job of ensuring quality specimens are collected from patients and are handled appropriately to provide accurate test results. All are key members of the healthcare team.

Every day, nurses, physicians, and other caregivers depend on laboratory professionals to perform tests on blood and other body fluids, interpret the results, and help provide a complete picture of a patient's health. Using modern biochemical equipment and complicated analysis, laboratories can detect the presence of cancer, identify infectious viruses and bacteria, determine which antibiotics might best treat an infection, measure glucose, cholesterol, or drug levels in blood, and select proper blood components for transfusion. Without this precise and valuable information, medicine would be guesswork.

We are currently facing a national, critical shortage of laboratory

professionals. There are approximately 300,000 clinical laboratory science (CLS) practitioners in the US. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics has predicted a need for about 93,000 CLS positions in the next four years.

Clinical laboratory scientists working in the laboratory today hold the minimum of an associate degree and are board certified by national certification agencies. Many hold baccalaureate or masters degrees, and may hold an advanced board certification in a specific discipline such as microbiology, chemistry, hematology, immunology, cytotechnology, or blood banking.

Many of Maine's community colleges and NorDx offer a Phlebotomy Certificate program. Central Maine Community College, University of Maine – Augusta, and University of Maine – Presque Isle offer Associate Degree programs in Clinical Laboratory Science. The University of Maine offers a baccalaureate Medical Technology program. NorDx also offers Medical Technologist and Histology Technologist Apprenticeship programs for applicants with the appropriate college degrees.

In honor of National Laboratory Week, April 18-24, congratulations to clinical laboratory scientists, phlebotomists, specimen processors, and laboratory support staff for their continued dedication and the vital contributions they make to healthcare as part of NorDx and the MaineHealth family.
