Nursing Assistant course produces valued employees

Maine Medical Center Nursing Services began offering a free Nursing Assistant course in 2000. So far, 106 people have graduated from the CNA course. Another 20 began the course on March 18.

Why is MMC offering the CNA course? Primarily it's to recruit CNAs to work at MMC. This is an opportunity to educate men and women here on our own units to deliver the best possible care to patients.

We know that working in long-term care is very different from working in a large tertiary care center. Starting out here at MMC shapes the perspective of the student from the beginning. CNAs are a vital part of the nursing team.

What do CNA students learn? All classes, skills labs, and clinicals are held at MMC. Students are taught to take vital signs, and help with patient mobility, hygiene, and nutrition. They learn to use their senses to report significant information to the RNs they assist. The State of Maine has a 150-hour curriculum that covers the life cycle so students are prepared to care for patients of all ages. Our course lasts ten weeks.

Joint Auxiliary Committee awards annual gifts

Elevator etiquette: A courtesy to our patients

Hospitals are busy places. We're all in a hurry and need to get where we're going and, naturally, we want to use the quickest route to get there.

Imagine you're transporting a patient for a test or procedure, or you have equipment that must be delivered stat to a nursing unit. You wait at the Bean elevator lobby. You wait, and wait, and wait. When the elevator finally arrives, you've waited upwards of 10 minutes with a patient who is uncomfortable or in pain. Or, the staff on a patient unit are wondering what has happened to their stat delivery.

And, when the elevator door opens, standing inside are a number of employees returning from their break, coffee cups in hand. When the escort asks staff to exit the elevator so they can transport the patient, they are ignored or receive a negative response.

Central Supply staff face these situations all day, every day. It's particularly difficult to get an elevator in the Bean Wing during shift changes. These elevators are still considered primarily for patient and supply transport, with exceptions being visitors and staff traveling to the Gibson Pavilion and the Barbara Bush Children's Hospital Inpatient Unit.

Employees and medical staff members are encouraged to use the Richards elevators to travel to other floors, especially between 0630 and 0830 hours and 1400 and 1700 hours daily. The Richards elevators may be a longer walk from where you are, but there are six of them compared to the four Bean elevators, so you may get a ride sooner and arrive at your destination just as quickly or even faster.

Please consider common courtesy, thoughtfulness, and confidentiality for patients, both in elevators and while waiting in elevator lobbies. The best way to give patients their privacy is to wait for another elevator or to give your elevator to a patient being transported. In fact, the transport aide may request that you leave the cab or wait for the next car for the patient's benefit.

Not only will you show you care for our patients in this way, they will arrive at their own destinations more quickly. Isn't that worth just a few minutes of your time?

Get your sleep, and drive safely

Yet, most Americans say they do not get the recommended eight hours of sleep recommended each night, and more than 66% of study respondents say they have sleep problems.

MMC's Maine Sleep Institute recognized National Sleep Awareness Week, April 1-7, and offers some information about

drowsy driving.

Who's at risk? Drivers who are: sleep-deprived, tired, driving long distances, driving at times they normally would be asleep, drinking, or taking medications that increase sleepiness; young people; shift workers; commercial drivers; people with undiagnosed sleep disorders.

Before driving: Get a good night's sleep, bring a companion, schedule stops every two hours, avoid alcohol and medications, consult your physician if you think you have a sleep

disorder.

The Drowsy Driver should: Look for warning signs of fatigue, recognize they are in danger of falling asleep, not count on the radio or an open window to keep them awake, find a safe spot for a break or nap, drink coffee for short-term alertness if needed.
