

New plan provides greater security

Maine Medical Center's Security Department recently completed an assessment of the hospital's security needs. This process included feedback from several customer groups, with a great deal of helpful information provided by nursing focus groups. The result is a new Security Management Plan for MMC that focuses on increased access control and perimeter surveillance, and includes a new policy concerning when we request assistance from the Portland Police Department.

"Employees have shared with us concerns for their or their patients' safety," says David Young, Security Director, "and numerous patients tell us they have had restraining orders served against specific people. Domestic situations seem to be following our patients and staff into the hospital. We think the new plan will help us address these concerns and help people feel more safe here.

"In order to efficiently manage after-hours access in a medical center as large as MMC," Young continues, "we must reduce the number of entrances used after hours. The new plan will provide just one after-hours

Emergency preparedness exercise to involve MMC, Spring Harbor

How would the Greater Portland community respond if a jet airplane carrying 125 passengers and crew crashed upon landing at the Portland International Jetport? A group of local agencies will find out when they take part in an aviation disaster drill, slated for Thursday, June 7, and Friday, June 8.

The simulated plane crash will occur on the 7th to test the community's emergency response systems, including those of the MMC Emergency Department and Spring Harbor Hospital. MMC will receive about 100 "patients" to triage. On the 8th, the SH/MMC mental health network will be asked

On the 8th, the SH/MMC mental health network will be asked to participate with the Red Cross in a "Family Assistance Center" at the Embassy Suites Hotel in Portland to simulate the creation of an emergency grief/counseling center for crash survivors and family members of victims.

This well-orchestrated drill is an excellent opportunity for the hospitals to test for disaster preparedness.

Now that the school year is ending, many Maine Medical Center employees will apply for tuition assistance for the courses they have taken this semester. MMC offers tuition assistance to regularly scheduled employees to support them in furthering their education to enhance their job knowledge and skills. We thought you'd like to know about this benefit.

Who is eligible?

You are eligible to receive tuition assistance if you:

• have been employed at MMC for six months

• are classified as a regular (not per diem) employee

• are an active employee, regularly scheduled for 20 or more hours per week

• are enrolled in a course or program that meets the reimbursement criteria. What types of courses are covered?

To be reimbursable, a course must lead to a substantial new skill or to knowledge development/enhancement. You must pass a course to receive reimbursement. Courses that qualify for tuition assistance include:

• any courses voluntarily taken to complete an academic degree (undergraduate or graduate) related to a current or reasonably predictable future position at the hospital

• individual courses voluntarily taken at a college to enhance job competence or to prepare for a future position at Maine Medical Center (for example, statistics, anatomy and physiology, accounting, computer science)

• multi-session certificate programs voluntarily taken at a college (for example, USM's certificate in management, housekeeping, or human resources)

• training in specific skills (for example, word processing or medical transcription) voluntarily taken to enhance job satisfaction or to prepare for internal transfer

• intensive, in-depth seminars or workshops in specialized clinical procedures not covered in regular academic coursework (for example, specialized physical therapy techniques).

• you must pass the course to receive reimbursement. What types of programs are not covered?

• courses required by a manager to improve the employee's performance. The manager should pay for this out of the department's budget.

• concurrent, short or halfday workshops at a professional conference. These costs should be covered by a department's own budget.

• a course specifically designed as preparation for a certification or registration exam. Exam fees, lab fees, and other registration fees are not covered.

• courses that lead to recertification of technical skills. How do I apply for tuition assistance?

This is a reimbursement program. Therefore, you pay for the course when you register and submit an application for reimbursement when you complete the course. MMC covers the first \$100 of a qualified course plus 75% of any remaining amount up to the eligibility limit. The IRS treats tuition assistance reimbursement as taxable income. Therefore, if you use this benefit, your year-end income statement will reflect the money you have received in reimbursement.

1. Determine whether the course is reimbursable before enrolling. Talk with your manager or Human Resources Training & Organization Development to determine reimbursability.

2. Send a completed Tuition Assistance Application Form to Human Resources within three months of completing the course. First attach proof of successful completion and proof of tuition payment (cost per credit hour) and get your manager's signature before sending the application to Human Resources.

3. The amount of reimbursement is determined based on your years of service and scheduled hours when the course began, and any tuition assistance you have already received during the current fiscal year. Refer to the Maine Medical Center Policy and Procedure Manual 603:3 for the reimbursement schedule.

entrance for visitors and patients and three entrance points for employees and all other authorized personnel."

When visiting hours are over in the evening, at 2000 hours, all visitors and patients must enter the hospital through the Emergency Department entrance. Visitors seeking late visits will be checked in by security officers and permitted to visit patients in patient units only if approved by the nursing unit. Valet Service will be extended to help manage afterhours parking.

Employees will be able to enter the hospital after hours through the Emergency Department entrance, or through the L.L.Bean Wing employee entrance or the Admitting entrance using the MMC ID card access system. ID badges will be required to gain access to the rest of the hospital from the ED.

You will soon see signs at the Admitting and Bramhall entrances directing patients and visitors to the Emergency Department after 2000 hours. Surveillance cameras at the Bramhall and Admitting entrances increase the ability of Security to monitor those areas. Emergency phones also have been added at the Bean employee entrance and at the Admitting entrance. When the receiver is picked up, these phones ring automatically to the Security Office for assistance.

The Portland Police Department was included in meetings to review the level of support MMC can expect to receive when they are called. The police have assured us that whenever there is a threat, they will respond to all MMC calls for assistance. A new Security policy covers requests from the units for emergent assistance. It gives the Security department guidance on prioritizing responsibilities, working with Nursing in emergent situations, and when to call in the police for their support.

Many employees have expressed interest in crisis intervention training. Security periodically provides this class to Security Officers; it will now be open to other employees. The class involves eight hours of training focusing on keeping patients and staff safe. It covers listening skills, body language, personal space, limit setting, and other topics. Crisis Prevention Institute materials are the primary resource for the training. A schedule of available class dates will be posted soon.
