MMCF sponsors major healthcare symposium

Former Colorado Governor Richard D. Lamm and Editor Emeritus of the New England Journal of Medicine Arnold S. Relman, MD, were among the speakers Friday, May 24, at the first spring symposium sponsored by the Maine Medical Center Foundation. The daylong event was an opportunity for healthcare leaders from throughout southern and central Maine to hear from nationally recognized observers of the rapidly changing world of healthcare.

More than 130 hospital trustees and administrators, physicians, and other healthcare leaders gathered at the South Portland Marriott for the symposium. "We wanted to bring these acknowledged experts, many of whom have been part of the faculty at the renowned Estes Park Institute for years, to Maine," says MMCF President Don McDowell, "to help us understand what is happening in healthcare. They provided both insight and challenge."

The speakers covered a range of topics: • Dr. Relman discussed the impact of the business of managed care on the art of medicine, and suggested that physician leadership will be essential for success.

• Governor Lamm advanced "Ten Rules for a Community's Health", from his perspective as a critic of the healthcare system and advocate of change.

 \cdot Connie R. Curran, EdD, RN, FAAN, discussed the transition to integrated care, and the opportunities it presents to improve care and save money.

History the topic at Women's Board meeting

One of Maine Medical Center's volunteer auxiliaries is known as the Women's Board of Maine General Hospital for good reason. The group was formed in January 1877, when one of MMC's founding hospitals, MGH, was not even three years old.

At the Women's Board's Annual Spring Volunteer Coffee, held May 22 at the Portland Country Club, the history of the hospital and the auxiliary were the topic. Board President Betty Jean Braley read from a history compiled by Sarah R. Rollins in 1939 and 1940; it was full of interesting tidbits. A few follow.

In the early years, the Maine General Hospital had five rooms for patients. Two women nurses covered day duty, one receiving \$15 a month, the other \$18, with board. A night nurse earned \$30 a month and boarded outside. There were also two male nurses.

The first purchase made by the Women's Board, or The Ladies' Visiting and Advisory Board as it was then known, was twelve rocking chairs for the comfort of patients.

In 1878, with a treasury of \$400, the Board voted to give \$250 for a "free bed". This paid the entire cost of the bed for one year. One feature of the bed was that the person or persons giving the funds to provide for it "could designate the occupant, and within limits, the length of time a patient could remain there"!

November 1884 brought the establishment of a training school for nurses and a course of lectures offered by members of the staff. The Ladies of the Board were invited to attend.

In 1907 came a request for a "Pied Piper" as the "rats were far too numerous and too friendly to be agreeable". A ferret was handed the job of ridding the hospital of the rodents and appears to have done a satisfactory job!

Three Women's Board projects stand out as achievements, according to Louise James, who also spoke at the meeting. From the 1920s to the 1960s, the Women's Board supported the salary of a social worker. A Memorial Fund, an innovative idea in 1940, grew so successful that it was turned over to the hospital for professional oversight in 1969. And the Coffee and Gift Shops (originating as The Canteen in 1947) provide service to patients and families.

The stories continue through the years, but there are too many to detail here. The theme running through the years and the Board's many projects is the service, loyalty, and caring of its members and volunteers. At the spring meeting, several of these were honored: Mrs. Phillips Payson, a member since 1935, Mrs. Sewall Strout, since 1938, and Mrs. Althea Noyes, since 1943. Others singled out for their efforts were Sally Rendall, Margaret Serunian, and Lucile Cleaves.
