MMC names Family Practice Residency Program director

Emergency Medicine Residency will come to MMC

One of the country's newest emergency medicine residency programs has been approved for Maine Medical Center. Six physicians will join the program each year, beginning in the fall of 1996.

There is a considerable need for residency-trained emergency medicine physicians in the U.S. While most specialities are over-served, more physicians are retiring from emergency medicine than are entering training.

According to MMC President Don McDowell, "We look forward to lessening the shortage of emergency medicine physicians, and to serving the needs of Maine people for highly qualified physicians trained in emergency medicine, as well as other specialities. The Emergency Medicine Residency Program is a welcome addition to Maine Medical Center's tradition of graduate medical education."

Because of a recognized shortage of board-certified emergency medicine physicians in Maine, particularly in rural areas, and the crucial role these physicians play in providing accessible care to Maine residents, the State Legislature raised MMC's revenue cap to fund this new program. (Revenue caps for Maine hospitals have since been repealed.) Research has demonstrated that half of all trained residents remain in the area where they receive their training.

New England is one of the last regions in the U.S. to have predominantly residencytrained, board-certified emergency medicine physicians in hospital emergency departments.

Family violence is everyone's problem: MMC responds

In Maine, a domestic assault occurs at least once every hour and 58 minutes. About 40 percent of all assaults in Maine occur between family members and almost 75 percent involve females assaulted by males. Almost 6,500 cases of child abuse or neglect and over 3,000 cases of elder abuse or neglect were referred to the Maine Department of Human Services in 1994.

Until recently, we addressed child abuse and neglect, partner abuse and elder or dependent adult abuse as occurring in isolation. We now recognize that in the same homes where children are being abused or neglected, their mothers may be battered and there exists the atmosphere and potential for elderly grandparents or dependent adults to be abused or exploited.

As healthcare professionals, we have a unique opportunity to intervene and prevent further abuse to women, children and elderly persons. Medical personnel are often the first resource families turn to for help. The simple identification of abuse by a healthcare provider can be a significant step toward ending the violence.

For years, the subject of family violence was taboo. As awareness has grown, however, so have our efforts to stop the violence. At Maine Medical Center, the Family Support Program has been working hard to create a vehicle for continuing education concerning family violence. The more we educate providers and give them resources, the more successful they will be in identifying and helping the victims of abuse.

A self learning pathway entitled "Identification and Intervention with Victims of Family Violence" is now available to all nursing units and ancillary hospital staff. The pathway has several learning options available: a video, articles, self awareness exercises, and role plays. For example, a pathway user can view "One Woman's Story", or talk with a mentor

As a result, there are few emergency medicine residency programs in New England -- no others in Northern New England, and only three in Southern New England. According to a 1992 study, only 18% of the state's physicians providing emergency care have residency training in emergency medicine, and only 45% are board-certified.

"The successful approval of our residency and the strong institutional support for it are tremendously satisfying. I have always been convinced that we are capable of training superb emergency physicians for our community and region. Now we have the wonderful opportunity to accomplish this objective," said George L. Higgins III, MD, Chief, Emergency Medicine.

An important aspect of the program is the MMC facility -- some residency programs move physicians in training to county, tertiary, and community hospitals to broaden their exposure to different patient situations. The Emergency Department at MMC provides all of these facets of patient care.

Mark W. Fourre, MD, Residency Program Director, Emergency Medicine, said "The Emergency Medicine Residency Program will attract top medical students from around the country. I look forward to working with them as they begin their medical careers in Maine."

concerning abuse issues, or learn more about his or her own attitudes about abuse and role play asking difficult questions about abuse. Pathway users will also learn when and how to report abuse and will receive a packet of resources for individuals and families affected by abuse. The pathway on Family Violence was developed by an interdisciplinary team, dedicated to addressing issues of family violence throughout the hospital.

MMC's Family Support Learning Pathway was developed by: Janice Charek, RN, Staff Development Specialist, Nursing Resources; Judith Howes, RN, Assistant Head Nurse, Outpatient Department; Sue-Ellen Muse, LCSW, Family Support Coordinator; Ellen Popenoe, PhD, Assistant Director, Psychology; Cynthia Tack, LCSW, Social Work; and Patricia Todorich, RN, Mental Health Nurse Specialist, Nursing Resources.

Individuals and families affected by violence should know that healthcare providers can be the link to intervention and safety.

MMC staff are trained to respond to these issues and will work with families to address their medical needs while assisting them to link up with safe accessible resources.

A guide to writing a Marketplace ad

Thinking about placing an ad in the Marketplace section of *What's Happening?* Here are some tips:

- 1. Start your ad with the merchandise you are selling or property you have for rent; starting with the merchandise makes it easier for the reader to locate your item for sale, for rent, etc.
- 2. Always include the price of the item you are selling or renting. More than 50% of classified readers do not respond to ads that do not include a price; they may assume it's out of their price range when it isn't!
- 3. Keep abbreviations to a minimum. Make it easy for readers to understand. When we run your ad in *What's Happening*, we'll use our standard abbreviations.
- 4. Place yourself in the reader's position. Ask what you would like to know about the merchandise for sale or the apartment for rent. Include information such as brand names, colors, and other specific descriptions.
