Women's health study results announced at MMC

A significant number of women who undergo hysterectomy for benign uterine conditions report substantial relief of symptoms and a marked improvement in their quality of life one year after surgery, note authors Karen Carlson, MD, Harvard Medical School, Buell A. Miller, MD, Maine Medical Center and Maine Medical Assessment Foundation, and Floyd J. Fowler, PhD, Center for Survey Research, in *The Maine Women's Health Study*.

Results of the study were announced at a news conference at Maine Medical Center Tuesday, April 5. This work is the largest prospective clinical study of hysterectomy in the United States to date.

The Maine study is an important first step in developing data to analyze the appropriateness of hysterectomy and its alternatives, the authors conclude. Hysterectomy is the second most common major operation in this country.

Many women who avoid hysterectomy and undergo alternative treatment for benign uterine conditions such as fibroids, abnormal bleeding, and chronic pelvic pain also find relief after such treatment. However, at least one quarter of these women will go on to have a hysterectomy to relieve symptoms within one year after conservative treatment.

Over 400 Maine hysterectomy patients treated for noncancerous conditions during the period June 1989 to January 1991 were interviewed three, six, and twelve months after surgery. The study group, representing patients of 71 percent of all Maine physicians who STUDY, SEE P.6

MMC's 1994 Goals: a closer look

PartI

Maine Medical Center's goals for 1994 cover a range of areas, from clinical initiatives to health care reform. *What's Happening* presents the first part of a point-by-point look at the eight goals driving MMC's overall pursuit of its mission this year.

Goal #1 Develop and implement clinical program plans consistent with the strategies outlined in the MMC Long Range Plan.

MMC's Strategic Plan was completed and approved by the Board of Trustees in February, 1992. A portion of that plan called for development of detailed plans to improve and expand specific clinical areas.

During 1993, work began in the first four of those areas: pediatrics, oncology, circulatory disease, and gerontology. Progress continues, but already the results have been positive. Subspecialists in important disciplines have been recruited in Pediatrics, for instance, and a multidisciplinary committee is reviewing the many facets of circulatory disease care. A multi-disciplinary committee is also ready to begin improving coordination of oncology care, with the help of a full-time staff coordinator. And a Gerontology Consultation Team will soon begin improving care of the elderly throughout the hospital.

In 1994, work will begin in five new areas: neurosensory/trauma, psychiatry, obstetrics/ gynecology, medical/surgical, and ambulatory care.

Pediatrics and Adolescent Medicine director named

John F. Goodrich, MD, has been appointed Division Director for General Pediatrics and Adolescent Medicine at Maine Medical Center. He has been Director of the Division of Adolescent Medicine here since 1987.

Dr. Goodrich is a 1968 graduate of Brown University; he received his MD in 1972 from the University of Cincinnati. His pediatric residency was served at Maine Medical Center and he completed a fellowship in adolescent medicine at the University of Washington in Seattle. In addition, Dr. Goodrich served as a general medical officer with the US Public Health Service.

Formerly a medical staff member at Kennebec Valley Medical Center and a consultant staff member at the Augusta Mental Health Institute, Dr. Goodrich continues, since 1981, to be a member of MMC's medical staff.

Dr. Goodrich was a consultant in adolescent medicine on the Governor's Task Force on Maternal and Child Health in 1981; he served in that role as well for the Department of Human Services, the Kennebec Valley Health Education Project, and the Foundation for Blood Research. He organized and oversees MMC's Teen Clinic and is a Clinical Assistant Professor of Pediatrics, University of Vermont. He also sits on the Physician Advisory Committee of the Maine Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program.

Dr. Goodrich is a Board Member of the Maine Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics, a member of the Cumberland County Child Health Initiative, and a member of the American Academy of Pediatrics, serving on the Provisional Committee on Native American Child Health.

Husband and wife share special bond

The first living non-related kidney transplant in Maine was performed at Maine Medical Center Tuesday, March 8. In the past, only cadaver and biologically-related donations have been transplanted here. Maine Medical Center is the only hospital in Maine where whole organ transplants are performed. Transplantation of kidneys from living non-related donors has occured only about 300 times in the United States.

On the 8th, Roger Heroux donated one of his own kidneys to his wife Sandra. Sandra had been on dialysis for two and a half years as a result of severe hypertension. The dialysis treatments took over most of the functions of her failed kidneys, cleaning most waste products from her blood.

Organ donation rates have been dropping in Maine and nationally, but the need for organs has not. There are long lists of patients waiting for kidneys and other organs. In

Maine, 75 people are waiting for kidneys; for New England, the number is 1,100. Nationally, 31,000 people are on waiting lists for various organs; 20,000 of these need kidneys. Living non-related transplantation represents one possible solution to the shortage in some cases.

Range Plan and supportive of the need for primary care practitioners in the state.

The Long Range Plan also called for continued support of educational programs. These include medical education, health professions education, and community health education. During 1994, the educational goal emphasizes primary care -- the "first line" of health care. MMC will seek accreditation of its proposed residency program in Emergency Medicine, approved by the Trustees last year. We will continue developing rural rotations of residents in primary care residencies such as Family Practice and Pediatrics.

MMC will also expand its long-standing commitment to outreach educational programs supporting hospitals and health care practitioners throughout the state. Clinical teaching experiences for health care professionals other than physicians will also be expanded, with an emphasis on primary care.

Goal #3 Review the status of our Research program and set institutional goals for the next five years.

The research emphasis at MMC over the past six years has been the development of a program that supports patient care and the education of physicians and others. External support for research activities has grown dramatically in the past two years, and is now supported by a combination of external support and unrestricted philanthropic gifts to the hospital.

The 1994 goals call for a formal review of the research program, and for fully integrating health services research and nursing research activities.

MMC's vascular lab receives accreditation

One American dies every 32 seconds of cardiovascular disease, disorders of the heart and blood vessels. Cardiovascular disease is the leading cause of death in the United States. Stroke, a disorder of the blood vessels to the brain, is the third leading cause of death and disability in this country, with 500,000 new strokes occurring each year.

Although life threatening if undetected, early detection of these diseases is possible with the use of noninvasive vascular testing techniques performed at vascular laboratories.

Maine Medical Center's is among the first 400 vascular laboratories in the U.S., Canada, and Puerto Rico to be granted accreditation by the Intersocietal Commission for the Accreditation of Vascular Laboratories.

Accreditation status signifies that the facility has been reviewed by an independent agency which recognizes the laboratory's commitment of quality testing for diagnosis of vascular disease. Participation in the accreditation process is voluntary and demonstrates the laboratory's concern for high quality patient care and attention to quality assurance.

regularly perform hysterectomies, was largely white, employed, and insured.

Researchers also examined nonsurgical treatment for the most common benign uterine conditions. Among their findings, they learned: • women who underwent hysterectomy had suffered from severe symptoms and multiple conditions that adversely affected their quality of life;

• hysterectomy resulted in a high range of symptom relief for most patients and a marked improvement in quality of life; and

• hysterectomy did not cause many side effects.

TAR WARS comes to Maine

Many area respiratory therapists, physicians, nurses, and other health care providers have become teachers in fourth and fifth grade classrooms throughout Greater Portland and the U.S. to present the TAR WARS program. The one hour TAR WARS curriculum actively involves students and focuses on the short and long term effects of tobacco use, why people smoke or use tobacco, and tobacco companies' advertising and promotional methods.

This presentation and a follow-up poster contest for students are attempts to present an honest picture of the pressures on kids to use tobacco and the consequences of their actions.

During this second year of TAR WARS in Maine, 130 health care providers will visit 125 schools and instruct over 5,000 fourth graders about important tobacco use issues. The posters students create will be displayed in shopping malls and other sites.

The participation of many MMC respiratory therapists, family practice residents, physicians (including AMA President Robert McAfee, MD), and others in this important disease-prevention educational effort are much appreciated.

Study subjects needed

Healthy adults, aged 18 and up, will be paid \$20 for their participation in approximately 2 hours of psychological testing. In order to participate, subjects need to meet the following criteria:

• a minimum of a ninth grade education, with no more than a Bachelor's degree;
