MMC physician elected ACC Governor-Elect

The Board of Trustees of the American College of Cardiology (ACC) has elected Peter K. Shaw, MD, FACC, as College Governor-Elect for Maine. At the March 1995 ACC Annual Scientific Session he will assume the duties of Governor for the state and serve until March 1988.

As Governor-Elect, Dr. Shaw serves in an observatory capacity in preparation for his role as Governor.

College Governors are the official representatives of the College within their areas and are responsible for the growth of the College and the promotion of its goals and objectives. The Board of Governors serves as an advisory body to the College officers and the Board of Trustees on regional patterns and trends in health care delivery as well as on legislative,

Sorting is important to MMC's recycling effort

Maine Medical Center generates thousands of pounds of mixed office paper each month. Sorting it is essential to the recycling program in order to minimize contamination. When the recycling program began here in July 1991, employees learned what can go into the blue recycling bins and -- more importantly -- what cannot.

Until recently, participants in MMC's Hospital Industries Program (HIP) have helped sort office paper destined for recycling. As a result, the Environmental Services Department identified a need for regular staffing to sort the large amount of recyclable paper generated at MMC each day.

Caring for children in the hospital takes special care



that was created to address this need and the position in Environmental Services was recently filled.

As a reminder, each blue bin has a large label affixed to its side giving examples of acceptable papers as well as contaminants. Sorters wonder if people know they can recycle manila folders and labels. And they have a list of items commonly found in the bins that shouldn't be: newspapers, magazines, books, facial tissues, paper towels, colored or hanging folders, fax and thermal paper, food and food wrappers, plates, and styrofoam.

Daily sorting greatly improves the value of the mixed office paper we send to Zaitlin and Sons, Inc. for recycling. Recent EPA information shows that for each ton of paper recycled, there is a savings of 17 mature trees and 380 barrels of oil! With the six and a half tons we recycle monthly, that's a lot of resources saved!

Center needs the help of health care providers

MMC resident an award winner

Michael S. Katz, MD, Anesthesia, is a resident physician recipient of the 1994 American Medical Association/Glaxo Achievement Award.

The award is presented to medical students and resident physicians who have exhibited outstanding leadership abilities in organized medicine, civic or non-clinical medical school or hospital activities. Ask Away!

From Anne Boehm and Janet Maguire, RN, in SCU, come these questions: "The Special Care Unit Cost Awareness Team received some thought-provoking questions in it's suggestion box. Could you help us with the answers?

"Can the plastic bags on equipment delivered from CSD be recycled as trash bags or used in some other way once they are determined to be clean?

"Is it necessary that MMC continue to supply employees with pens? This generates a tremendous supply which often seem to be replenished without regard to cost. We did put bins in our locker rooms so pens can be recycled back into the Unit.

"Both suggestions could make an impact on cost throughout the hospital. Is it worth the effort?"

The first of these questions was passed on to Estella Esposito, RN, Head Nurse of the Central Service Department. She answers: "It certainly would be an advantage to recycle the clear plastic bags used by CSD staff to identify clean equipment. They are great used as waste basket liners, for discarding things other than biohazardous items, and for use as "dust covers" for many items stored on Units. Thanks for your concern and interest!"

David Blakney, Inventory Distribution Manager, responds to the second question: "MMC uses medium point black and red pens. They are determined to be the most effective and necessary to properly complete multiple part forms and other documentation as well as maintain the readability of documents that are copied or faxed.

"Your question prompted a look at usage since 1989. On average, we use approximately 100,000 pens each year. There has been a five percent reduction in use of pens over this period. Finally, the cost per pen has decreased by 37 percent. MMC participates in the Voluntary Hospital of America contract for office products. This has resulted in very aggressive pricing for member hospitals.

"In summary, a five percent decrease in usage may suggest awareness of the need to maximize and control the utilization of our resources, pens in this case. We should also consider other items as well! It has been suggested that placement of 'boxes' at convenient locations for employees to deposit pens to be returned to service may help reduce the rate of consumption. Your question displays and promotes this type of awareness and is essential to any success in this area. Thank you for asking!"

How to conserve hot water

A substantial portion of your monthly energy bill is for heating water. To save money on those bills and to insure you always have hot water when you need it (in the middle of a shower, for example), here are a few simple steps you can take.

First, fix any leaky faucets by replacing worn-out washers. One drop a second wastes more than 3,000 gallons of hot water a year. Next, install flow restrictors or reduced-flow shower-heads in all showers. And make sure your hot water pipes are wrapped with insulation wherever they pass through unheated spaces.

Then there are the things you can do about the way you use hot water. For example, only run the dishwasher when it's full. Use warm or cold water to wash clothes. Don't let the hot water run continuously when you're shaving or washing your face. Try to limit your shower time to under five minutes. You'll be warmly surprised at the impact these few simple actions will make on your heating bill.

These tips come to us courtesy of the Medical Services Federal Credit Union. Watch for more tips from time to time in What's Happening.
