Children's Miracle Network receives gift

Maine Medical Center's Children's Miracle Network has received a gift of \$12,000 from the Visiting Board of the Children's Hospital. This gift marks the largest single contribution to the Children's Miracle Network Program at MMC, now in its second year, and is designated to support the Pediatric Residency Program.

Mrs. Bruce T. Myers, President of the Visiting Board said, "the Children's Miracle Network's mission is clearly important to this community. Together we hope to preserve and enhance the ability of Maine Medical Center to provide for the children of Maine."

MMC joined the Children's Miracle Network, a nationwide network of children's hospitals and hospitals with strong pediatric programs, in 1990. The Children's Miracle Network Telethon is one part of the program. MMC offers "Real Health" and John Havlicek

Men in their 30s and 40s face unique health and fitness challenges. The demands of career and family, combined with the inevitable effects of age, make it difficult to stay — or become — fit and healthy.

The key to the challenge is information, and Maine Medical Center has responded with *Real Health*, a day-long seminar on Saturday, May 4, at the Sonesta Hotel in Portland. The day is devoted to the pursuit of a healthy, active male lifestyle, with an emphasis on practical, usable information.

The *Real Health* team is composed of physicians and other healthcare professionals from MMC's staff, and the team captain will be former Boston Celtic John Havlicek.

Havlicek, 50, is living proof that lifelong fitness and health is possible. One of the most durable and consistently outstanding athletes in the history of American sports, his message is that everyone, not just worldclass athletes, can have *Real Health*.

Covered in the day's events are exercise as part of a busy life, how to *not* get hurt while getting in shape, nutrition for performance and all-around health, how to monitor and change risk factors for a host of ailments, and information about a few uniquely male topics. Havlicek's keynote address will precede lunch, included in the day's activities. Participants will be able to have their cholesterol, blood pressure, and vital lung capacity checked, also at no additional cost.

MMC is offering all this for a nominal \$15 registration fee, as part of its ongoing community education efforts. "We believe," says Director of Public Information Wayne L. Clark, "that part of our mission is to serve as

Procedure will cross the Atlantic

A recent addition to the healthcare team in MMC's Neonatal Intensive Care Unit was Gabriele Elsner, a medical student at the University of Heidelberg Medical School. Elsner spent several weeks working in NICU, where one of her accomplishments was completing the review and testing required for certification in Neonatal Resuscitation.

The program was developed by the American Academy of Pediatrics and the American Heart Association primarily for training of physicians and nurses. The program has been widely disseminated in the USA, but this may be one of the first trans-Atlantic transactions.
