Homelessness is focus of Social Work Month

"There's No Place Like Home," but for many Americans "home" is no place. An estimated 2 million people in America are homeless. The number of families seeking emergency shelters increased 31% between 1985 and 1987. In the past fifteen years, average housing costs have risen three times faster than incomes. Two and one-half million people a year are displaced from their homes as a result of rent increases, urban development, condominium conversion, or arson. Almost one in every five homeless people has a job, but due to inflation they may not be able to afford housing.

March is National Social Work Month, and each year the profession embarks on a public service campaign to further understanding of matters bearing on the social and economic well-being of the American people. This year the focus is on homelessness and its impact on families and children.

At Maine Medical Center social workers try to help homeless persons and families connect with shelters and the community resources that will help with long-term solutions. Homeless inpatients may include families who have been burned out, or elderly persons whose confusion leads to eviction from their apartment or boarding home.

Social Workers Julie Schirmer and Ursula Pascarella in the Emergency Department and Karen Curley in the Outpatient Department, frequently assist outpatients, individuals and families who come for treatment for medical conditions or emotional crisis and may also be without the financial resources to have a permanent living situation. MMC helps Dietetic Technician students

How many onions does it take to make onion soup for 600? By the end of 20 weeks, students in the Dietetic Technician Field Experience Program will know how many onions are needed and what happens to the soup before it is ladled into a bowl in the cafeteria or on a patient's tray. In fact, the number of onions is the most basic of the knowledge these students will carry into their new profession.

Maine Medical Center's food preparation area, the largest in the state, is where students gain hands-on experience in a joint program set up by MMC Food Services Director Mary Keysor and Alice McFarland, Instructor in the Dietary Technician Department at

Southern Maine Vocational Technical Institute (SMVTI). Jerry Goulet, MMC's Production Manager, coordinates the supervising of the students and oversees their activities in the Food Services areas.

The American Dietetic Association accredited program requires students to spend time in the classroom and in the field. "Maine Medical Center approached the school," Keysor said, "and a program was devised that would benefit everyone involved: the hospital gains much-needed workers and fulfills its mission as a teaching institution and students gain valuable practical knowledge during the first of a two-year program."

Students are allowed flexibility in arranging their schedules around classes

Dietitian shares view of professional roles

March is National Nutrition Month, and we've asked Pam Perkins, RD, of MMC's dietitian staff, to share her thoughts on the role of the hospital dietitian.

"Nothing about feeling sick is easy, particularly when it comes to food. It's too hard to chew, too painful to swallow, or too nauseating to contemplate. It's a strange topic to think about in a month dedicated to the celebration of healthy food choices, but it's a topic to remember when caring for any patient intolerant to food.

"As a dietitian, my job is to carry through the concepts of healthy food choices as they apply to various diseases. For other health professionals my roles involve offering educational programs and information as well as recommendations regarding the optimal variety, consistency, nutrient content, and mode of diet therapy.

"For the patients, I'm a visitor, someone without a needle or diagnosis, who can talk about something comforting and familiar: food. Often it's not the food that is therapeutic, but the smile, touch, or conversation.

"Although March is National Nutrition Month, it's always refreshing from my standpoint to remember that although maintaining good nutrition is essential to health and recovery, food isn't always everything."

The social workers help these patients to obtain shelter, food, work or income while helping the individual also work towards a plan to come up with a long term resolution of the problem, such as mental health treatment or vocational rehabilitation.

PROGRAM, from page one _____ and part-time jobs in order to accommodate the requirements of the program. By spending a specified number of hours in each of eleven food service areas, for a total of 135, participants are familiarized with:

- · inventory and budget review of foodstuffs and supplies in the Storeroom:
- · processing and distribution of recipe ingredients:
- · the Cook/Chill production and inventory systems;
- · production and distribution in the Bakeshop:
- · sanitation and infection control. cafeteria service, and safety procedures in the Dishroom;
- special dietetic and formula preparation in the Diet Kitchen;
- short order grill procedures, menu orders, and patient line service:
- · quality assurance and record keeping in team tray service;
- · menus, records, audits, and public relations in the cafeteria: and
- · special functions, ordering, and billing in Catering.

Students choose the Diet Tech program for various reasons. Candie Horton became interested when she was a Dietary Aide here at MMC and saw students "learning by doing." Jean Murdoch had a personal interest in nutrition and someday would like to work in a school cafeteria.

Each week, two new students are phased into the program. What they learn in classes at SMVTI is highlighted by what they do here at MMC. Since they are exposed to all facets of the Food Services operation, the future Dietetic Technicians get the opportunity to see which phase they may be most interested in. By the second year of the program, participants will most likely have focused on a career, such as hospital, nursing home, WIC, HeadStart, or like Murdoch, school food services. When they leave SMVTI, some may even be hired by MMC. At this point, they will all know exactly how many onions are needed to make 600 servings of onion soup: 64 pounds.
