


Holiday decoration policy reminder

Not to put a damper on the holiday spirit, but rather to observe fire safety practices:

- Evergreen trees or live greens, in any form, cannot be permitted on the hospital properties.
- Electrical lights or electrified ornaments cannot be allowed.
- Decorative materials-tinsel, posters, hanging items, or materials that are easily ignited (e.g. flammable crepe paper)cannot be permitted. Tinsel and artificial trees must be of the fire retardant and self-extinguishing type.
- Materials should not be placed such that they impede hospital traffic or jeopardize personnel/patient safety (e.g. hung so that they could catch on an IV pole or strike a person's face or eyes).
- Materials cannot be placed over glass in the fire hose cabinets or vision panels in doors. As always, discretion should be used in the manner in which items are attached to painted surfaces so that tape does not remove the paint.


