When a customer buys flowers at the Flower Box at Maine Medical Center, it's not just the recipient who benefits. The Visiting Board of the Childrens's Hospital operates the Flower Box for the benefit of the pediatric programs at MMC, continuing the mission to which the auxiliary committed itself in 1910.

The Flower Box had humble beginnings in 1951, when Visiting Board members began selling flowers supplied by a local florist. Today, it's a full service shop, selling everything from a single rose to special orders for luncheons and parties. Board members staff the Flower Box, performing all the necessary functions, from purchasing to ringing the cash register. The use of volunteers, many of whom contribute many hours each week,

increases the amount of money available for the Visiting Board's work.

Nicotine joins list with heroin, cocaine

A new report by the U.S. Surgeon General calls nicotine an addictive drug, comparable to cocaine, heroin, or morphine. Surgeon General C. Everett Koop issued the report, a compilation by 50 scientists, with a call for action on tobacco addiction, which he said kills more than 300,000 Americans each year.

Nicotine, the report says, acts on specific receptors in the brain and other parts of the nervous system. It also relaxes skeletal muscles and affects the heart, blood vessels, and hormonal system.

Like those addicted to other drugs, the report says smokers use the drug compulsively, develop tolerance to it, and suffer physical withdrawal symptoms when they try to quit. Relapse rates among those who quit smoking, the report says, are similar to those who quit illicit drugs.

Nicotine's addictive properties include its mood-altering, stress-reducing properties. It also helps suppress appetite.

The good news is that 37% fewer Americans smoke now than a decade ago, and that smokers now comprise only 27% of the population. The bad news is that 320,000 deaths each year are caused by tobacco products.



"The Impaired Hospital Worker"

More than ten years ago the American Medical Association began to focus attention on physicians whose ability to provide patient care was reduced because of overwhelming personal problems or by abuse of drugs or alcohol. Nursing organizations also raised concerns about nurses whose abilities were compromised. Today annual conferences are devoted to the problem of impaired professionals. Dr. Edward Robinson, of MMC's Department of Psychiatry and a consultant for chemical dependency, will speak about the dilemma created when the effectiveness of hospital employees is reduced by addiction, psychiatric problems, age, or infirmity. What dangers exist for patients and other staff members? How can co-workers recognize impairment? What resources are available to combat this difficult problem? Come find the answer to these concerns and others.
