# Bicyclist getting ready for long ride

The snow has put a damper on his bicycling, but Karl Kaffine, LPN, is putting in a lot of training time this winter. When he's not performing his nursing duties on R5, he's swimming at the YMCA and working out on a cycling trainer at home.

And well he might be training, because this summer he'll be spending seven weeks pedalling his bicycle across the country. The trip isn't just a lark: Karl will be raising money for the American Lung Association while indulging a long-time fantasy.

Karl and 300 or more other bicylcists will leave Seattle, Washington June 6, and arrive in Atlantic City, New Jersey July 22. The ALA bills the TransAmerica Bicycle Trek—3,400 miles through 40 ma-

jor cities—as the largest coast-to-coast non-competitive cycling event in the country.

"I'd been thinking about riding across the country," Karl says, "and this was an opportunity to do it in a unique way and do something for a good cause at the same time."

The riding is only part of Karl's concern. The other is raising the minimum \$5,000 in pledges required to ride. He has convinced a number of Portland merchants to provide prizes for a raffle, and is actively selling tickets.

The snow may have slowed him down for now, but well before June, Karl expects to back on the road three days a week. Never a competitive cyclist, he nevertheless has trained up to 300 miles a week.

And for a 3,400 mile trek, training is a good idea.


#### The mail room

Every day at 7:45 AM Anderson Williams arrives at the Maine Medical Center mail room and sorts the morning mail. That's no small task, considering the 8–10 mail bags containing 350 pounds of letters, magazines, and packages for the entire hospital.

There are over 300 mailboxes for everyone's mail, including patients, the medical staff, residents, medical students, departments and administration.

On a typical day it takes Williams five hours to sort it all.

The other half of the day Williams spends presorting the outgoing mail, about 3,500 pieces, mostly letters. He checks them for zip codes, weighs them and runs them through the postage meter. He then bundles the mail for Direct Mail of Maine, the outside mail house to pick up. They sort the mail by zip code and bring it to the post office for general delivery the next day.


