Gagnon and crew keep hospital's ovens busy

When you combine $2\frac{1}{2}$ pounds of flour, nearly 2 pounds of shortening, and a little over 3 pounds of sugar with a few other ingredients and bake it, you get a yellow cake that can feed 120. To frost it, you need another $4\frac{1}{2}$ pounds of confectioner's sugar and $1\frac{1}{2}$ pounds of shortening.

Quantities like those are nothing new for Marcel Gagnon, who has been running MMC's Bake Shop since March. He worked for 25 years in a retail bakery— Riley's Bakery in Biddeford—and says that the procedures here are different, but not the quantities.

One difference is the way recipes are handled; the ingredients above came from a computer print-out of a recipe for "Cake, Gold, Sheet (scratch)." Gagnon says it was difficult getting used to a computer telling him how much of what to put in, but he's learning. (All recipes at MMC are computerized, to make it easier to control inventory, cost, and nutritional content.)

The products produced by MMC's Bake Shop are similar to those found in a retail bakery: cakes, pies, danish, muffins, etc. Something Gagnon enjoys making but for which there wasn't much call in the retail trade was custards, but now he has more than enough opportunity. One thing he misses is the deepfried pastries, like bismarks ("maybe if we get a fry-o-lator," he says).

Like other portions of the Food Services operation at MMC, the Bake Shop serves the needs of patients, the Cafeteria, and the Catering service. All three have different needs and place varying demands on the Bake Shop, and Gagnon says balancing those demands is a challenge.



Student nurses help MMC, themselves

The MMC Department of Nursing has expanded its summer employment opportunities for student nurses by introducing the Student Nurse Employment Program (SNEP). The program provides clinical exposure and employment for the students and needed assistance for MMC's nursing staff.

The SNEP is open to freshman and sophomore students enrolled in a Bachelor of Science in Nursing program. The students receive an intensive 100-hour classroom/clinical course leading to Certified Nurse Assistant status. On completion of the course, the students work at MMC throughout the summer and perhaps into the next school year. The program, an extension of one developed in previous years for junior-level students, is mutually beneficial for the student and the hospital. It provides the students with summer employment and earlier exposure to the clinical practice setting than is found in most programs. **SNEP**, page 3

• Entries must be submitted in person, and entrants must have a MMC Photo ID.


There is no entry fee.

Winners will be announced July 8, 1987.


