College rescues MMC's teleconference plans

Teleconferences via satellite are a growing educational tool in health care. Maine Medical Center was preparing last Spring to join the ranks of hospitals with the capability of receiving satellite signals, when a problem arose. There was no place on the MMC campus where a dish could be located without being subject to "TI"—terrestrial interference. The problem was microwave signals from a nearby communications facility, and it appeared that an accident of geography might deny teleconference capability to MMC.

Another accident of geography, along with the generosity of another Portland institution, have brought satellite signals to MMC despite the problems. Westbrook College, located four miles from MMC, has established a microwave link to the hospital, enabling MMC to tap satellite signals received by the College's dish.


The link with MMC is the first of its kind for Westbrook College, which opened its Satellite Video Teleconference Center a year ago. It is a member of the National University Teleconferencing Network and the BizNet system, and it can tie into other systems as well.

MMC will now be able to tap into the enormous number of national teleconferences on subjects ranging from administrative and policy issues to medical issues and advances in treatment. The programs are received by a tower on the roof of the Richards wing, and viewed through the hospital's closed circuit television system.

J. Mark Kjeldgaard, M.D. 1944 -1986

The Maine Medical Center community was saddened last week by the death of J. Mark Kjeldgaard, M.D., Director of the Division of Pulmonary Medicine and attending physician in the Department of Critical Care Medicine at MMC. Dr. Kjeldgaard died suddenly at his home in Yarmouth, Maine on October 25.

Speaking for the hospital family, Medical Staff President Newell A. Augur, Jr., M.D., said, "Mark was a wonderful person and dedicated doctor who made innumerable contributions to Maine Medical Center, his colleagues, and his community. He was a caring physician who will be missed by his patients, and an active, concerned professional who will be missed by all those with whom he worked. We are all irreparably diminished by his death."

Dr. Kjeldgaard was born in Brush, Colorado, graduating with distinction as a scholar and athlete from Brush High School in 1962 and from St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minnesota in 1966. He KJELDGAARD, page 2

received his medical degree with honors from the University of Colorado in 1970 and was a resident in Internal Medicine at the University of Colorado Medical Center in Denver from 1970 through 1972.

Following a fellowship in Pulmonary Diseases at the University of Rochester at Rochester, New York from 1972 through 1974, Dr. Kjeldgaard returned to the University of Colorado as Chief Resident in Internal Medicine. He subsequently completed a fellowship in Pediatric Pulmonary Diseases at the University of Colorado.

Dr. Kjeldgaard joined Maine Medical Center in 1975 as an attending physician in Pulmonary and Critical Care Medicine. He was Associate Director of the Division of Pulmonary Medicine from 1975 through 1982 and in 1982 was appointed Director of Pulmonary Medicine and was serving in that capacity at the time of his death. He was appointed Associate Professor of Medicine at the University of Vermont in 1983. He served Maine Medical Center in many educational and administrative capacities, most recently as a member of the Executive Committee of the Medical Staff.

He was active in many professional societies, including the Maine Thoracic Society, which he served as President; the Eastern Section of the American Thoracic Society, which he served as councilor for Maine; the Maine Lung Association; the Maine Medical Association; the Cumberland County Medical Society; and the Society of Critical Care Medicine. He was a diplomate of the American Board of Internal Medicine and of the Subspecialty Board of Pulmonary Medicine.

He was a member of the First Parish Congregational Church in Yarmouth and was active in the formation of the Church Peace Committee. He was on the steering committee of the Maine Nuclear Freeze and a member of Physicians for Social Responsibility. Dr. Kjeldgaard was an avid fly fisherman, an accomplished gardener, a cabinetmaker of distinction, and—by no means the least of his accomplishments—an amateur brewer.

Two special funds have been established in his memory by his family, friends, and colleagues: The Pulmonary Medicine Education Fund, c/o the Pulmonary Medicine Division, Maine Medical Center, and the Kjeldgaard Peace Education Fund, c/o of Physicians for Social Responsibility, P.O. Box 4202, Station A, Portland, Maine 04104.
