Hiebert named Chief of Surgery at MMC

Portland surgeon Clement A. Hiebert, M.D., has been named Chief of Surgery at Maine Medical Center. The appointment was confirmed by the hospital's Board of Trustees at its July meeting, and announced last week by F. Stephen Larned, M.D., MMC Vice President for Medical Affairs.

"We're delighted that Dr. Hiebert has agreed to serve in this important role for the institution," Dr. Larned said. "The needs for the department and the institution are great, and we're sure that the talent, skill, and expertise he will bring to the job will be of great value to both. We look forward with excitement to working with him."

MMC President Edward C. Andrews, Jr., M.D., said he is "pleased to have one of our own serving in this vital capacity. Dr. Hiebert is highly qualified and nationally recognized, and he enjoys the support of the other members of the Department of Surgery."

Dr. Larned noted that former Chief of Surgery James M. Thomas, M.D., will devote his time to MMC's Surgical residency program and matters related to it.

A *magna cum laude* graduate of Bowdoin College, Dr. Hiebert received his medical degree from Harvard Medical School. He served an internship and assistant residency at Massachusetts General Hospital and was a Harvard Research Fellow at Strangeways Research Laboratory in Cambridge, England. He also served a surgical residency at Massachusetts General Hospital and was a Senior Registrar in Thoracic Surgery at Frenchay Hospital in Bristol, England.

Dr. Hiebert has been a member of the Attending Medical Staff at Maine Medical Center since 1960, and is a past president of the Medical Staff. He is Director of MMC's Division of Car-

diovascular and Thoracic Surgery, and a Clinical Associate Professor of Surgery at the University of Vermont School of Medicine. He is a member of the medical staffs of Mercy Hospital in Portland and Northern Cumberland Memorial Hospital in Bridgton, and has served as president of the Cumberland County Medical Society.

Dr. Hiebert is a Diplomate of the American Board of Surgery, of which he is a Director. He is also a Diplomate of the Board of Thoracic Surgery, and a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons, American College of Chest Physicians, and the American College of Cardiology. He holds a Certificate of Special Qualifications in Vascular Surgery from the American Board of Surgery.

Dr. Hiebert has been a visiting professor at a number of hospitals and medical schools throughout the world, including the University of Toronto, the University of Madrid, Spain, the University of Hanover Medical School, West Germany, and the University of Rio Grande de Norte, Brazil.

Director named for Parent/Child units

M. Lynn Moulthrop, RN, is the new Director of Parent/Child Nursing at Maine Medical Center. The appointment was announced by Vice President for Nursing Judith T. Stone, RN, and includes responsibility for the Labor/Delivery Unit, Postpartum Unit, Neonatal Intensive Care Center, Newborn Nurseries, Pediatrics Unit, and Infant Intensive Care Unit.

Ms. Moulthrop was most recently Director of Maternal/Child and Gyn Nursing at Riverside Hospital in Newport News, Virginia. She has previously worked as a Day Camp Nurse at Cambridge Community Center, Cambridge,

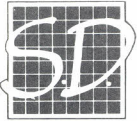

Summer program helps area youth

Maine Medical Center has just completed its second year of participation in the Summer Youth Employment Training Program. The program employed eight Cumberland County youths aged 14-21 for eight weeks, and was made possible by a unique public-private partnership.

SYETP is a federally funded program designed to provide opportunities for employment and training to disabled and economically disadvantaged youths. The federal funds are channeled through the Cumberland County Training Resource Center in Portland, which provides counselling and referral to the program, and Maine Medical Center provides the worksite and supervision.

The program is an adjunct of the Hospital Industries Project of the Rehabilitation Medicine Department at MMC. Key to the success of the SYETP program at MMC, according to Employment Developer Robert Franciose, is the cooperation and willingness of the supervisors in the various departments involved. He says the time they have spent in identifying the specific needs of the program participants has been essential.

This summer, SYETP participants worked a total of 4,000 hours in Housekeeping, the Cafeteria, Food Ser-

vices, Rehabilitation, Parking, and Outside Services. Three economically disadvantaged youths with above average learning skills worked in Data Management and the Laboratories.

An important component of the pro-

gram is the provision of educational opportunities. An expanded series of sessions this year gave participants training in job safety, the labor market, employment evaluations, application and interviewing skills, and basic banking skills.
