# Walking is good for noontime or anytime

It's something most of us are pretty good at, something we've been doing for a long time, and something that's quite good for us. Walking, according to Al Wicken, P.T., Director of Physical Therapy in MMC's Rehabilitation Medicine Department, is a beneficial and enjoyable exercise. Unfortunately, he says, walking is so basic it has been overlooked in favor of its flashier relative, running.

Short walks at noontime are a good way to get into walking, Wicken says, and walking is a good way to get on the road to fitness. A brisk, uninterrupted walk of 20 minutes or more is beneficial for cardiovascular fitness, burns a respectable number of calories, and helps reduce and control stress.

Those things are more often said about running, Wicken notes, and it's unfortunate that running has eclipsed walking. "The result of the fitness boom and its emphasis on running and other highexertion activities," he says, "is that the fit have been getting fitter and the rest haven't been getting into fitness."

Walking can carry the same benefits as running, on a smaller scale, but doesn't carry the same risks of injury. It doesn't require expensive equipment like running shoes, and can be done vir-WALKING, page 2

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# Smoking switch due in Cafeteria June 2

The smoking scene changes in MMC's cafeteria on Monday, June 2. The entire "main area" of the Cafeteria will be the non-smoking area, and the space made up of Conference Rooms A and B will become the designated smoking area.

The new smoking area has been outfitted with exhaust fans, and the sliding wall separating it from Conference Room C will be in place. All this will serve to keep smoke away from traffic and nonsmoking tables more efficiently than was possible when the "smoking corner" of the Cafeteria was the designated area.

The move---combined with a sharp reduction in the number of designated smoking areas---completes the hospital's compliance with instructions received from the Board of Trustees on September 26, 1985. At that time the Board reaffirmed its policy on discouraging smoking at Maine Medical Center by restricting smoking to designated areas. It

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also instructed Administration to review the more than 40 areas that were then designated for smoking to ensure that they met the criteria set forth by the Board.

As the review was carried out, the criteria established by the Board were rigidly interpreted. Many areas were found not to be in compliance with policy, and many departments eliminated their smoking areas accordingly.

The following are the only designated smoking areas the meet the criteria: OR Smoking Lounge, Labor/Delivery Smoking Lounge, Housekeeping Smoking Lounge, Research Department Library, Radiology Department Smoking Lounge, and the designated areas in the Coffee Shop and the Cafeteria.

The criteria, set in 1980 when the Board adopted the present policy, are that designated smoking areas must be: (1) well ventilated, (2) out of the general flow of patients and visitors, (3) accessible to all in the department, and (4) an area nonsmokers are not required to use.

tually anywhere. A runner himself, Wicken says there's nothing wrong with running except that it's not for everyone-and walking *is* for just about everyone.

"A brisk twenty-minute walk at noontime," he says, "is something almost everyone can do, and our part of Portland is fertile ground for walking." The Western Promenade is green and pleasant throughout the summer, and the West End is full of historic, attractive buildings. Greater Portland Landmarks, Wicken says, even has a walking-tour guide to the West End.

Most people should be able to walk in their normal work clothes. Heels more than one inch high are not a good idea, but otherwise any comfortable shoes or sneakers are fine for walking. It's always a good idea to stretch out before any exercise, Wicken says, but with walking it isn't essential. The only caveat, he says, is that as with all exercise it's a good idea for anyone over 35 who has been generally inactive to check with their physician beforehand.

What to do about lunch? Wicken suggests eating something light either before or after walking, and notes that some studies have indicated that one way to balance calories is to eat most of your calories during periods of the day you are most likely to burn them off. Wicken is a member of the employee health promotion committee, *Health-Styles*, and he and *HealthStyles* Coordinator Mary Eileen Kiniry are working on a way to measure some specific walking routes around the West End. Wicken would also like to pursue the idea of a "stretching station" at the Promenade end of the hospital's property. He says runners and walkers alike could benefit from such a station.






