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Traditions come and go at 38th Honor Night

The Honor Night tradition just grows stronger every year, and the 38th annual MMC "thank you" to employees---May 13 at the Holiday Inn Downtown---was no exception. It came, as President Edward C. Andrews, Jr., M.D., said, "after what has not been the easiest year we've ever had."

And that's what Honor Night is all about, he said: "The way you people have handled the past year of pressures and demands: Through it all you have shown how much you care, not only for our patients, but also how much you care patients' families. . . . And it's important that you know how very much we care about you." Dr. Andrews' message to some 500 employees attending was delivered on behalf of all in the MMC Administration.

Speaking on behalf of the Board of Trustees, Vice Chairman Robert L. Woodbury, Ph.D., said: "The trustees really know how much is demanded of you and how very hard you all work...it makes us very proud to be trustees---not because of what we do, but because of what you do."

Representing the Medical Staff was J. Howard Hannemann, M.D., Director of the Division of Radiation Therapy. He acknowledged there might be some inadequacy of physicians in expressing their gratitude to MMC employees on any regular basis, but: "We do notice all that you do for us; I hear unsolicited compliments over and over. We are grateful, and we are very, very proud of what you do---nowhere in the country is it done so well."

The Reverend Alexander B. Cairns, ector of Pastoral Services, gave the invocation, and Vice President for Employee Relations Ronald J. Baril introduced the evening's program. Baril HONOR, page 3

ADULT CHILDREN OF ALCOHOLICS Classroom #2

Wednesday, May 21 4:30 - 5:30 PM

Author Janet Woititz (*Adult Children of Alcoholics, Struggle for Intimacy*) speaks of the characteristic needs and behavior of adults who were raised in alcoholic families. "Adult Children" are more and more clearly recognized as having many feelings and experiences in common. These characteristic qualities can produce real difficulties unless they're understood and used as a basis for developing new ways of feeling, responding, and coping.

PREGNANCY ON THE ROCKS Classroom #2 Wednesday, May 28 4:30 - 5:30 PM

This is a hard look at the effects of fetal alcohol syndrome (birth defects due to alcohol use by the mother), and the dangers of alcohol use—at any level during pregnancy. Interviews with parents of children suffering from fetal alcohol syndrome point out both the difficulties of managing alcohol abuse during pregnancy and the possibilities for dealing positively with these types of birth defects. Strongly recommended for maternal-child caregivers and those planning pregnancies of their own.

THE DISEASE CONCEPT OF ALCOHOLISM Classroom #7

Wednesday, June 4 4:30 - 5:30 PM

This is a fascinating presentation by Dr. David Ohems on the definition and treatment of alcoholism as a disease. Discussion includes: the different, progressive stages of alcohol addiction, changes for successful treatment at each stage and current research on physiological factors that may contribute to alcohol addiction. This film should interest anyone concerned with the subject of alcohol dependency, but is particularly recommended to caregivers of alcoholic patients.
