PRIDE IN NURSING, a sentiment we share year 'round, came shining through most vividly last week as MMC celebrated National Nurses Day. Evidence of that pride was everywhere on May 6, as some members of the Department of Nursing appeared in traditional uniform, from crisp white cap to toe; physicians sent fruit baskets or flowers to many units; some units sent flowers in salute to other units they work with closely through the years; nursing directors sent flowers to their units. Special events of the day included a Professional Issues Seminar during which guest speaker, Maine State Senator Barbara Gill predicted that the State Legislature would attempt to commit increased funds toward health promotion and encouraged her audience to provide input, both as professional nurses and as consumers. Vice President for Nursing, Judith T. Stone, RN, shared her throughts on "one of the most privileged of all professions" during two open meetings to which all nursing personnel were invited. She quoted an old but still valid definition of nursing that stated nurses provide for those abilities or capacities that people would do for themselves if they had the strength, will or knowledge. "Think about that a minute," she said, "Recount, remember, revisit some of those times when you as a nurse provided the thinking, mobilizing, ministering, and motivating that was missing at the time. You did this with skill and talent garnered from your education and your experience. Think how wonderful it feels to fill those vital human functions. How powerful we as individual nurses are when we assess all of our capabilities and capacities for enhancing another's world..."
