"Open House" planned to recruit volunteers

Maine Medical Center's volunteers worked 52,581 hours last year in support of the hospital's patients and staff. That was 2,000 hours more than in the previous year. And all indications are that a need for more volunteers to give even more hours will continue to increase.

With the new spaces and expanded services provided by the construction and renovation project now up and running, volunteers have assumed new commitments (such as helping to staff the reception desks in ASU and Labor/Delivery). The Volunteer Office is looking to a continuing rise in the number of requests for volunteer services and --- with the aid of a small committee of "recruiters" --- is taking steps to assure MMC of a positive and prompt response.

They are presenting a "Volunteer Opportunities Open House" on Tuesday, February 4. The program, from 9:30 to 11:30 AM, will feature a slide presentation showing volunteers at work in various jobs throughout the hospital, give a chance to hear firsthand from our volunteers about where they work and what they do, and offer brief tours of some of the areas where volunteer opportunities exist.

There are opportunities for men and women in many areas of the hospital, and volunteers are needed at all times, days, evenings and weekends. Presently, volunteers work in over 60 areas and departments of MMC including: the Admitting desk (2,301 hours last year), Emergency (3,695), Central Service (3,087), Information Desk (2,585), and the Pediatric Playroom (2,455). They serve visitors and staff in the Coffee Shop, Gift Shop and Flower Box, provide clerical help for various offices, circulate the Art, Craft, and Gift carts, serve as **OPEN HOUSE**, page 3

Parking problems are a part of winter

Winter has handed its usual double whammy to the parking ramp at MMC: weather that makes more employees want to park "inside," and a busy inhouse schedule for the hundreds of students in MMC's many teaching programs. With several significant storms behind us and a good chance of more to come, the ramp has been and is certain to be again, full and frustrating.

While investigating options for some more permanent and convenient parking alternatives, the hospital has arranged --- with thanks to the City of Portland --- for backup parking in the lot behind the

new Ice Arena. MMC student groups are now assigned to park permanently in the backup lot (pink parking passes identify students' cars).

On days when the ramp continues to fill up, employees may be sent to the backup lot, as follows:

- Parking attendants will inform drivers entering the ramp that it is, as best as they can determine, full.
- The driver may still choose to cruise through the ramp and look for a spot (and probably get lucky as someone pulls out).
- The driver who cannot find a place on the ramp may park behind the Ice Arena. The parking attendant will provide

- Drivers who opt to park behind the arena when the ramp is full, should be sure to tell the parking attendant this; the attendant will alert Security who will provide shuttle service back from the Arena. At the end of the day shift, the shuttle will take employees from the bottom of the ramp back to the Arena; employees working beyond shift change should contact security directly when they are ready to leave. (While the shuttle does not operate daily for students, they are welcome to ride when it is operating for employees.)
- It is important to note that the Bramhall lot, used as back-up during the first few days of our winter woes, is no longer an option; employees parking in the Bramhall lot will pay the full, \$.35 an hour fee

Those are the nuts and bolts procedures for dealing, at least in the near future, with a full ramp. But there are frustrations on the ramp, even with the new backup plan. Those frustrations come, incredibly, because some drivers are still not managing (or caring to take the time) to park between the lines. It's especially maddening for drivers who are


circling the ramp, looking for the last few spaces on full days.

Violators who take up more than one parking space are contacted and are required to move their cars. But that hardly ever happens in time to be of any use to those other, early drivers who could not find a space, says parking supervisor Mary Thibodeau.

Effective immediately: anyone requesting additional MMC parking sticker(s) must show the registratin slip(s) for the vehicle(s) to be stickered. The Parking Office is open from 8 AM to 4 PM, Monday through Friday; the phone is ext. 2123.



Lapham honored by state PA group

Robert Lapham, PA-C, of MMC's Emergency Department, has received the first Outstanding Service Award from the Downeast Association of Physician Assistants. Lapham is the first recipient of the award, established to "recognize the hard work and achievements of those who have helped to make and will continue to develop the professional stature of PAs in Maine."

The award recognizes Lapham's work in helping establish the post-graduate residency in Emergency Medicine for physician assistants at Maine Medical Center, a grant-funded program which

produced 22 physician assistants specially trained in emergency medicine.

Also noted is Lapham's service on the Physician Assistant Advisory Committee to the Board of Registration in Medicine, helping to develop rules and regulations for physician assistant practice. Among the committee's successful projects was the revision of the prescriptive formulary for PAs

Lapham is a past president of the Downeast Association of Physician Assistants, and a member of its Board of Directors. Current president Drew Travers, PA-C, noted in the award presentation that "his most outstanding achievement has been the development of continuing professional excellence for PAs in the state. The Annual Conference on Acute Medical Problems, now in its eighth year, is an excellent example of the outstanding contributions of Bob Lapham to the profession."

Lapham is a graduate of Boston University and the Physician's Associate program of the Yale University School of Medicine. He is a member of the American Academy of Physician Assistants, and is Board Certified by that body. He has worked in MMC's Emergency Department since 1975.
