Reception plans to include food and fun

Holiday caution urged to prevent trouble

The holiday season brings special plants, decorations, toys, and craft materials -- and potential danger from all of them. In order to keep holidays a safe time, especially for children, the Maine Poison Control Center at Maine Medical Center makes the following safety suggestions:

• Most Christmas greens, such as Balsam, Juniper, Cedar, Pine, and Fir, are low in toxicity. They can produce skin, eye, and stomach irritation in some individuals.

• Holly is very toxic, especially the berries and leaves. The results of ingestion can include nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, and central nervous system depression.

• Mistletoe is extremely dangerous: one or two berries may cause poisoning and even death in children. The berries in packaged mistletoe are often plastic, greatly reducing the potential for harm.

• The Poinsettia's reputation as a deadly plant is not deserved, although it can cause skin or stomach irritation.

• Some decorations require caution. The liquid in bubbling lights is methylene chloride, which is moderately toxic if ingested or inhaled. Fireplace colors are composed of various metal salts of moderate toxicity. The propellant for snow spray is toxic if inhaled.

• Alcohol, whether in beverage form or as part of the formulation of cosmetics or aftershave lotions, is potentially dangerous to children.

• Button batteries (disc batteries) are dangerous if swallowed. The casing corrodes in the stomach and intestinal tract, releasing the caustic contents.

• Most glues and adhesives have some toxicity; caution is in order.

• Keep the Poison Control Center's telephone number -- 1-800-442-6305 -- near your phone.

• Buy and have on hand a bottle of Syrup of Ipecac to induce vomiting, but use it *only* if directed by a physician or the Poison Control Center.
