Come for coffee and please spend money!

Long awaited, eagerly anticipated, newly renovated, expanded, improved... all the right words apply as two of MMC's most familiar, and sorely-missed areas get set to re-open. The Coffee Shop and the Gift Shop will be open for business better than ever, Tuesday, December 3.

Coffee will be served free all day Tuesday as a welcome back to customers, according to Mrs. Raymond J. Mercer, president of the Women's Board of Maine General Hospital which operates the two shops.

The re-opening of the two shops will combine some business-as-usual with some new and exciting changes, Mrs. Mercer says. The shops' hours will be from 8 AM - 5 PM, Monday through Friday.

The Gift Shop, which has expanded into the area vacated by the Flower Box, will be stocked with its usual offerings, ranging from gifts for newborns to mystery novels, toiletries and jewelry, gifts in good taste for patients of all ages, and practical pick-up items for visitors and employees as well. Gift Shop manager Addie Munroe, and the shop volunteers will have far more attractive and spacious quarters now in which to display and sell the stock; and shopping will be far more convenient for those who drop in, says Gift Shop chairman Carol Low.

Flower Box hours are from 9 AM to 4:30 PM, Monday through Friday, and 11 AM to 3 PM on Saturdays. There's a preview sampling of many of the holiday items that will be available now in the display cases in the basement corridor of the Richards Wing.

Proceeds from the "Christmas Wonderland" holiday sale will benefit the MMC Pediatric Unit and its patients, as do the proceeds from the Flower Box's year 'round operation. The Visiting Board of Children's Hospital is made up of 50 active members who volunteer in many areas of the hospital as well as the Flower Box. The Coffee Shop, with its handsome new furnishings and equipment will have seating now for about 100 people; this increase over seating for 85 is possible because the shop has expanded into the patio area. Some new menu items will include: Eggs Benedict for breakfast, a special Coffee Shop Club Sandwich, homemade soups and chowders, and a daily luncheon special consisting of the soup of the day (or chowder on Friday) and half a sandwich, according to Ceil Harnden, Coffee Shop chairman.

Their most important feature, and most important to remember about the Coffee and Gift shops is that they are operated by the Women's Board in support of the Board's projects to benefit MMC and its patients. The Women's Board has been organized and active in support of the hospital since 1877, and they opened the Coffee and Gift shops' predecessor---a canteen with one table and a counter seating eight, plus a gift counter---in 1947.

Since its founding the Women's Board has contributed nearly \$1 million to hospital projects and programs, including research, laboratory and clinical equipment for various areas, scholarships, and building and renovating projects. The Board is presently completing its pledge of \$200,000 to MMC's capital campaign, "To Meet The Need."

Last year, 119 volunteers gave more than 6,400 hours of service to the two shops and their customers.

Quitters hear from those who went before

If experience counts for anything, the would-be ex-smokers who attended the panel discussion on the day of the Great American Smokeout had plenty to draw upon. Three ex-smokers on the panel represented 38 years of smoking and 12 years of ex-smoking. Each had a different smoking history, and each had quit by a different method.

The panel discussion was organized by *HealthStyles* to provide employees who were smoking out on November 21 with the benefit of the experiences of their colleagues who had quit. Exsmokers Judy Thomas, RN, Staff Development, Betsy Bolton, RN, P1A, and Wayne Clark, Public Information, were joined by Clinical Psychologist Melvyn Atfield, Ph.D., also an ex-smoker, and Oncology Clinical Nurse Specialist Karen Kane, RN, a never-smoker.

Judy Thomas began smoking in college and worked her way quickly to three packs a day. Seven years ago, she and a friend went to a clinical psychologist for a single hypnosis session, and she hasn't had a single puff since.

Betsy Bolton, RN, started smoking when she was 15, and quit last year after taking a *HealthStyles* smoking cessation course with Mel Atfield.

Wayne Clark smoked two packs a day for nine years, starting in college, and quit cold turkey four years ago.

The three had different reasons for quitting, and went about it differently, but the single common theme was the commitment to quitting. Each one came back to the desire to quit and the decision to quit as the key to success. In fact, they agreed that once the decision had been made, the actual act of quitting was anticlimactic.

The new ex-smokers at the discussion talked about how their Smokeout day had gone. There were complaints of headaches, fatigue, and higher anxiety levels, but the group as a whole was doing well. Some had just completed the three-day intensive smoking cessation course offered by Mel Atfield, and others had approached the day in their own ways.

What did those "smoking out" learn? That others had been through it and survived, that their attitude was the most important concern, and that the benefits of quitting were well worth the temporary discomfort.
