The substance abuse film series from HealthStyles begins today, with some changes in the original schedule. The series is designed to provide employees with a broad perspective on the issue of substance abuse. Some films are geared to the personal impact of abuse, others to the role of the health care profes-

After each film, Jackie Robinson of MMC's Psychiatry Department and Al Bergman of Social Work will be available to answer questions and lead discussion. Guidelines Wednesday, October 16, 4:30 - 6:00 PM, Classroom 4. A filmed lecture by Father Martin, on the attitudes we have that affect our response to alcoholism. This film is strongly recommended for those with a professional interest in alcoholism.

The Disease Concept of Alcoholism Thursday, October 24, 11:30 AM - 1:00 PM, Classroom 4. A presentation by Dr. David Ohlms on the definition and treatment of alcoholism as a disease. It includes definition of the stages of alcohol dependency, chances for successful intervention at each stage, and current research on biochemical factors in addition. Strongly recommended for physicians, nurses, and others involved in the treatment of alcoholics.

Enablers Monday, October 28, 4:30 -6:00 PM, Classroom 4 (Note time and location change.) and

Intervention, Wednesday, November 6, 11:30 AM - 1:00 PM, Classroom 1. These films show the effect of alcoholism on the family and friends of an alcoholic.

Enablers explores the ways alcoholic behavior is tolerated or actually encouraged by friends and family seeking to avoid the problem. Intervention shows the same family preparing to confront the alcoholic with her behavior in a formal meeting guided by a counselor.

Friday Night Five Thursday, November 14, 4:30 - 6:00 PM, Classroom 9. (Note time and location change.) Shows the experiences of five people during a Friday night out on the town and what happens to them as the night goes on.

Cause the Effect/Effect the Cause Wednesday, November 20, 4:30 - 6:00 PM. Classroom 4. Another look at attitudes toward alcohol abuse. The main character, a businessman who is treated in a hospital Emergency Room, is dealt with by several ER staff members. Strongly recommended for those directly involved in the care of alcohol abusers.

Cocaine: The End of the Line Monday, November 25, 4:30 - 6:00 PM, Classroom 4. Factual, first-hand accounts of the experiences of five people who developed cocaine addictions after being "casual" users of this increasingly popular drug.

Denial, Not Me Monday, December 2, 4:30 - 6:00 PM, Classroom 4. A humorous treatment of a serious subject: denial. Explores how the pain of living with an alcoholic is rationalized in ways that prevent more useful efforts to cope with the problem.
