Social work is vital part of hospital care

A hospital patient's problems can extend far beyond the physical or emotional illness that brought him or her to the hospital. The recognition that the patient has "psychosocial" needs that must be met was responsible for the birth and growth of hospital social work, and has made the social worker an integral part of today's health care team.

Social workers play a unique role, concerned not only with the illness or injury itself, but with the effect it has on the ability of the patient and family to cope with the demands of everyday life. They help those involved adjust to their situation and its impact on their environment, and they serve as the "bridge" to the outside world of housing, finance, employment, insurance, home care, and an array of community resources.

At Maine Medical Center, 10 medical social workers and 20 psychiatric social workers cover all areas of the hospital. All share a common body of knowledge, but there are specialties: Outpatient and Emergency; Pediatrics, Intermediate Intensive Care, and Burn; Orthopedics, Pulmonary, and Alcoholism; Medical/ Surgical; Nephrology; Oncology, Neurology, and Urology; Perinatal/Neonatal and OB/GYN; Rehabilitation and Closed Head Injuries.

The Psychiatric social workers work in the Therapeutic Nursery, which is the preschool portion of the Division of Child Psychiatry; in Child Psychiatry; in the adult outpatient mental health clinic; in the Day Treatment Center; in the Geriatric program; in the Emergency Department; and in the inpatient psychiatric unit on P6.

Director of Social Services Pamela Taylor, ACSW, LCSW, says social work at MMC is "built around the concept of self-determination -- having the patient and family make the decisions, with Vol. 16, No. 34

guidance and support from the social worker. It's our job to help them deal emotionally with what's happening to them and with its effects on their situation. In the case of a traumatic injury, for example, it may be difficult for the patient to deal with the reality of his condition but there can be added problems with marital stresses resulting from role reversal and dependency, along with financial problems, insurance problems, and so on.

Siblings welcome at next parents' meeting


The next meeting of MMC's Parents of Handicapped or Chronically III Children group will be Thursday, March 21, at 7 PM in Classroom 4.



patient care means you have more and more people trying to cope with the demands of everyday life on a continuing basis. Regular, intensive psychotherapy from the psychiatric social worker, and a strong liaison with community support services can help these people function more successfully."

The counseling function of the social worker is the least visible part of the work. Social workers spend much of their time talking with the patient and family, assessing how they are coping with illness, determining where there is support and where there isn't, identifying needs for education and assistance, and helping them talk through issues like chronic illness and death. On both the psychiatric and medical sides, the use of support groups is growing as a therapeutic tool. In all settings, the social worker is part of the interdisciplinary team.

The more visible portion of the social worker's role is in referrals to communi-

ty services, discharge planning, and patient advocacy. They work with local and state government agencies, nursing homes, community health agencies, insurance companies, and a myriad of other resources. They may make arrangements for placement in an extended care facility, advocate for insurance coverage or disability benefits for the patient, or perform any of dozens of other tasks.

Social workers at Maine Medical Center all hold four-year degrees, and many hold master's degrees. All have at least minimum state licensure, and seven recently passed the Maine Licensed Clinical Social Worker examination, the highest level of licensure for social workers in Maine.

Q What is fiber?


A Dietary fiber is food components that cannot be broken down by digestive enzymes. These include cellulose, hemicellulose, lignin, pectins, and gums. The most common sources of fiber are whole grains, fruits, and vegetables.

Q How can I decrease my intake of sodium?


A Removing the salt shaker from the table and decreasing intake of processed foods are the most important steps in reducing intake of sodium. Use herbs and spices instead of salt to flavor foods. Avoid processed foods such as commercial soups, ready-to-eat and canned foods, pickles, and cured meats to which salt is added in appreciable amounts.
