Assessing needs a grass roots effort

The \$48,350 Maine Medical Center employees gave to this year's United Way campaign becomes part of more than \$3 million that will be allocated to 37 participating Greater Portland agencies. Where and how the money will be used will be decided by volunteer committees, men and women in the community who devote a great deal of time and research to making the best possible use of our donations.

Allocation decisions are based, in large part, on the contents of the Community Needs Assessment Report, a document reflecting two years of dogged, detailed work by, again, a community-based group of United Way volunteers. It's the Social Planning Committee, charged with seeing that United Way help goes to programs effectively related to current needs. Presently chairing the committee is Mrs. Donald N. Reed of Gorham (immediate past president of the Friends of Maine Medical Center). A member of the Social Planning Committee for the past eight years, she was very much involved in the latest assessment report published in 1982, and is now working on an updated report.

The 1982 assessment has become a landmark document, widely used by individual, private and public provider agencies, and has been quoted often in various local and state legislative hearings. "It's an information base that doesn't seem to exist in any other way," Mrs. Reed says. "It's been so widely used and well quoted, in fact, that its 'discovery' led many people to think it's the first report we ever did."

It is the first broad-based study the committee has done; previous reports have been single-issue oriented. "More STUDY, page 2

and more, the United Way is getting involved in community problem-solving," Mrs. Reed says. "No other body has taken the task on, and Greater Portland is way ahead of other United Ways assessing community problems. We've had the expertise for a long time." The 1976 report on Children and Families at Risk, she says, is still a working document eight years later.

The current report reflects a grass roots effort that contributes significantly to its effectiveness, Mrs. Reed says: "All along the way individual members of the community are involved; they knew they had the chance to make a difference, to have a real impact on their community."

The process began in 1980 when the committee sent questionnaires to more than 300 individuals and agencies, government and community leaders. The questions could be summed up as asking: What do you see as the most outstanding problems/needs in this community?

The high priority problem areas cited in the community survey were (in alphabetical order): adolescent pregnancy, domestic violence (child abuse and neglect, spouse abuse, sexual abuse), housing (low-income families), "idle" youth (juvenile delinquency, adolescent unemployment), and substance abuse (adolescent and adult).

The second phase of the study was spent in holding open-forum meetings on each of the above issues. All agencies and individuals associated with the issues were invited to participate as were the general public, as concerned citizens or as victims of the problems. "And they did come, and they did speak up," Mrs. Reed says. "People with problems were heard. And one of the best things to come out of the forums was the chance for service providers to meet and talk with each other. They are usually so overwhelmed just keeping on top of the needs in their own service areas, they don't have the chance to get together unless somebody arranges it for them."

The next step in the process was to form subcommittees to address each problem area and contract with qualified experts to write reports on those areas. The reports present the problems, suggest reasons for the problems, and recommend ways some agencies might respond to the problems.

The document has stood for two years as the basis for United Way decisions on support of new programs as well as for

continued support of established programs. Its worth has been proven in improvements now to be found in the problem areas it identified.

That is not to say the problems have gone away, Mrs. Reed notes: "The general feeling, as we begin updating the Assessment Report is that the same needs will be in evidence, but probably with a different emphasis.

"United Way supports the Family Crisis Center which now exists to alleviate some problems that go with domestic violence. The section titled Domestic Violence in our next report might read differently, but the problem will not have gone away.

"Day One is in operation now, with United Way support, but I feel we'll still have a section of the report titled Substance Abuse, because that has not gone away."
