#### Dr. McAfee is Maine's first AMA trustee


Robert E. McAfee, M.D., has been elected to the Board of Trustees of the American Medical Association. He is the first Maine physician ever to serve on that Board.

Members of the 12-position Board are elected by members of the AMA House of Delegates, 350 physicians representing every state and every medical specialty in the country. There are four Board positions open every election; Dr. McAfee was one of four elected from a field of eight candidates. The term is for three years, and trustees are eligible to run for three terms.

Membership on the Board is a position for which physicians must mount active campaigns, Dr. McAfee says. He had at least 22 interviews before other state AMA delegations during which he presented his views and answered questions on issues (such as the proposed Medicare freeze and matters of ethics) of concern to physicians across the country. Dr. McAfee campaigned with the official support of the full New England delegtion to the AMA. "I think that speaks well for the system," he says. "If you're a viable candidate, the system will get you there, no matter how relatively small a state you represent." He notes that not only is his election a first ever for the State of Maine, it is also the first time in 25 years that a "small" state has won representation on the AMA Board.

"This will be good for the State of Maine," Dr. McAfee says. "There will be good spin-offs for local physicians; it will be good for recruiting, and there will be an added and excellent information sharing system for physicians and hospitals here."

spent on Board Service. Dr. McAfee notes the least active trustee last year spent the equivalent of 50 days on Board work; the most active spent some 250 days. He plans an active role, but one that will not interfere with his own practice or with his affiliations with Maine Medical Center and Mercy Hospital.

Dr. McAfee has been a Delegate to the AMA since 1974, and was chairman of the New England Delegation from 1976 to 1983; he is a past chairman (1981-83) and member of the AMA's Council on Long Range Planning. Locally, he is a past president (1980-81) of the Maine Medical Association, and has served since 1967 as chairman of the MMA's Recruitment, Aid and Placement Committee. He is also a past president of the Cumberland County Medical Society.

A Portland native, Dr. McAfee is a graduate of Bates College and Tufts University School of Medicine. He served his internship and surgical residency at Maine Medical Center.


He has maintained a private practice in general and vascular surgery and has been Attending Surgeon on the staffs of MMC and Mercy Hospital since 1965. He was Chief of Surgery (1972-81) and is presently Chief of Vascular Surgery at Mercy Hospital. He is a Consultant in Surgery at Pineland Hospital and Training Center in Pownal. He has served as an instructor and Assistant Professor of Surgery at Tufts University, and is currently serving as Associate Professor of Surgery at the University of Vermont Medical School.

Dr. McAfee has served on the Mercy Hospital Executive Committee and is presently a Trustee of Mercy Hospital; he serves on the Tumor Consultation Board of MMC.

He has served on the Board of Directors and the Project Review Committee of the Maine Health Systems Agency; as past president and current Executive Committee member of the American Cancer Society, Maine Division, and the National Board of Directors of the Cancer Society; and on the Board of Directors of Maine Blue Cross and Blue Shield.
