Vol. 15, No. 48 Pay policy changing for 2nd, 3rd shifts

Does working evenings and nights leave you feeling "out of sync" with the rest of the world? Is rotating through all three shifts a stressful and inconvenient schedule? Is an hour longer on the second shift and still longer on the third shift? The answers are "yes," "yes," and "it only seems that way."

It has long been recognized by hospitals and other businesses that for a number of reasons it takes more to get people to work those hours. This recognition takes the form of a *differential*, an incremental increase in pay for working second and third shifts.

Maine Medical Center is changing its differential policy July 1, moving from a flat rate (\$.50 an hour differential for both second and third shifts) to a percentage system based on the midpoint of the employee's pay range. Evening shift employees will be paid a differential of 5% of the midpoint rate, with a minimum of \$.50, and night shift employees will receive 10% of the mid-point rate, with a minimum of \$.75.

The new policy differentiates not only among the three shifts, but also among various pay grades. Under a flat rate system, according to Compensation Manager Margaret Boulos, "a flat rate of fifty cents equals a higher percentage of pay for employees who are in the lower end of the pay structure; i.e., fifty cents is approximately 10% of pay at the lower end and only 4% at the higher end. The reality is, it takes more than a 4% differential to attract people in the higher grades to the evening and night shifts."

Many departments have second and third shift staffing, including Nursing, Housekeeping, Food Services, Engineering, Data Management, Pulmonary Medicine, Laboratory, Medical Records, Parking, Pharmacy, and Switchboard. Two-thirds of the evening employees are nursing personnel, as are three-

quarters of the night personnel.

Vice President for Nursing Judith T. Stone, RN, looks for two particular changes as a result of the policy change. "There has always been a shortage of nurses willing to work permanent nights," she says, "and there has always been unhappiness about rotating through evening and night shifts." The new rates will, she hopes, encourage more nurses to elect permanent nights, and make rotation through second and third shifts more palatable.

The need to work rotating shifts, Miss Stone says, is perhaps one of the greatest complaints professional nurses SHIFTS, page 2

Rains couldn't spoil MMC's Flag Day event

The rains that fell -- sometimes softly, sometimes heavily -- on Maine Medical Center's Flag Day ceremony June 14, could not dampen the spirits of the participants and guests, nor the meaning of the occasion.

For the guests, protected by the Bramhall entrance canopy, for the speakers and the U.S. Marine Corps Color Guard who stood in the rain, and for the patients and visitors who paused to share the moment, it was a time to remember. MMC Chaplain John Simpson set the tone of the celebration in

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have. "But," she says, "in order to have high quality patient care, some rotation must exist." She explains that it is important to have a core of permanent second and third shift nurses, but at the same time, "we feel it is essential to have people on at night who have a perspective of care that incorporates what happens to patients during days. People here during times of lower staffing levels and fewer available resources need strong abilities to deal with problems and make judgements.

"The only other alternative to rotating shifts," she continues, "would be to fill the second and third shifts on the basis of seniority. Then you would have a shift composed primarily of your least experienced nurses, including many just out of school. That's not good for patient care, and it's not good for the new nurses.

"The change in the differential policy, especially the higher differential for the third shift, was made because we want to maintain quality nursing care on all shifts, and because we recognize that shift rotation is an inconvenience and a disruption of an individual's schedule, and that it carries a particular set of stresses."

There will be no immediate impact from the new policy for the evening shift. The differential for evenings is already \$.50, the minimum under the new policy, and there is presently no pay grade in the evening for which 5% would be greater than \$.50. All night shift employees will receive at least a \$.25 per hour increase under the new policy, as the new minimum of \$.75 replaces the straight \$.50 of the old policy.

An additional benefit of the new policy is that it makes MMC even more competitive in the Maine and New England markets. RNs working evenings and nights at MMC will receive differentials at or above the rate paid at other Maine hospitals and in line with those at hospitals in Boston and the balance of New England.

his invocation:

Cardiac Rehab is topic of conference

Interest in cardiac and pulmonary rehabilitation exercise programs is growing in the medical community, and a major conference on the subject is scheduled in Portland July 10 and 11. MMC Medical Staff members Peter K. Shaw, M.D., and Jeremy Morton, M.D., will join 18 other specialists from a variety of disciplines to form the faculty for the conference.

Keynote speakers at the conference will be Herman K. Hellerstein, M.D., and William P.
