Visiting outside of hours can be problem

"We want our patients to have visitors," Cindy Bridgham, RN, says, "but sometimes we do have to say 'enough." The pressure of too many visitors at too many times during the day (especially when the patient is an employee) is a problem throughout the hospital, but especially on Maternity and Newborn Nursery, where Cindy is Head Nurse.

"Everyone wants to see a new baby, and check on the mother," she says, "and it's good for patients to have visitors -- to a point." The difficulty, she explains, is that "we have not one but two patients, and both must be cared for, have time together, and have time to rest. The father or support person and other close family members also need time with mother and child, and

we encourage it as a way of developing family unity."

On Maternity, with its already small and crowded rooms, the sheer numbers of people visiting can create problems. It's not just father, family, and friends who want to see the mother and child, but also an obstetrician, a pediatrician, residents and students, two or more nurses, dieticians, phlebotomists, and the TV hostess.

Cindy notes that the average stay on Maternity is down to just three days, and that this puts a lot of pressure on education efforts. Education in post-partum care, breastfeeding, and so on must take place in about a two-day period, along with everything else. The babies spend as much time with their mothers each day as possible, and the presence of visitors during that time interrupts the important mother/child interaction.

Patients, Cindy says, often aren't willing to tell an off-hours visitor they're tired, and often don't realize themselves just how worn out they are. Having short visiting hours and asking people to not visit at other times helps keep the patient from becoming overtired.

Visiting hours on Maternity and Newborn Nursery are 2:30 - 4:00 PM, and 7:00 - 8:00 PM (fathers or support persons anytime). Antepartum patients are often transferred in from long distances, and visiting hours for them are more flexible because of the importance of having family visits. . . Cindy says, "We hope visitors -- especially employees -- will observe the hours. It's the best thing for all concerned."


Honor Night 1984 is ready to happen

Diabetes is topic of May 12 conference


