Vol. 15, No. 33 "What You Don't See" applauded by Trustees

Following their regular monthly Board meeting on February 25, Maine Medical Center's Trustees settled back to watch a special presentation by directors of several MMC departments. Billed as a program on "What You Don't See," it featured some of the departments whose employees work more behind the scenes than in the public eye.

The directors presenting were: Michael Swan, Housekeeping; Ken Davis, Linen Services; Robert F. Underwood, Food Services; and Edward F. Hollidge, Engineering Services. Here, in the first of a series, is a glimpse of what the Trustees saw: some startling statistics and interesting insights into hospital housekeeping, according to Mike Swan.

"Housekeeping is not a department of exotic machines or chemicals, but a department that depends on the work and skill of its people to get a monumental job done," Swan said.

"In order to accomplish our housekeeping responsibilities for the hospital we require more than 200 employees, and have a budget of \$2,500,000 per year. Approximately 80 per cent or \$2,000,000 of that budget is for salaries and wages. That will tell you the most important asset we have in our department is people," he said.

Using a slide program prepared by the Audio/Visual Resources Department, Swan showed some of Housekeeping's 200 people at work in some of the many places they work, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Some fascinating facts and figures emerged: Within the main hospital buildings, they keep clean about 550,000 square feet of space.

Rotary report proves fund most helpful

The Rotary House Fund, half way through its second year of providing emergency housing for families of MMC patients, continues to demonstrate its worth as a cost-effective and caring program.

The fund, set up by the Rotary Club of Portland, is administered by the MMC Social Services Department, with referrals from Admitting or Emergency. Eligibility is determined on a variety of individual family factors, as is the amount of assistance provided. The fund operates on a special arrangement worked out by Rotary with the Executive Inn of Portland. It can also be used at other hotels and rooming houses.

MMC's report to Rotary for the second quarter of the 1983-1984 fund year shows it was used 48 times to help 21 patients' families. The total spent for the quarter was \$2,025, bringing the year's total to \$4,806.

Family members using the service included spouses, parents, siblings, and a grandparent. Patients came from 11 of Maine's counties, New Hampshire and Tennessee. A majority of the patients were children, including 11 premature infants receiving care in NICC: only two of the patients were adults, both obstetrical patients.

Get ready, get set: ... Volksmarsch!

What is a volksmarsch? It's a friendly, non-competitive public walk, originated in Germany to encourage people of all ages and physical abilities to come together and enjoy outdoor exercise. The walks, generally covering distances of 10 and 20 kilometers (6 and 12 miles), are not intended to be contests of speed or endurance. All who finish their chosen courses, however, do receive an award, generally a medal, plaque or plate.

Volksmarsches are popular and currently being held in Germany, Switzerland, Lichtenstein, Luxembourg, Denmark, Italy, France, Belgium, Norway, Sweden, Ireland, the Netherlands, Great Britain, Canada and parts of the United States.

Southern Maine's first volksmarsch is set for Sunday, May 20, sponsored by Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Maine. The walks -- a 6 and a 10 kilometer course -- will begin and end at the USM Portland campus. The 6K course follows streets to and about the Old Port area; the 10K course takes in the Eastern and Western Promenades as well. (The average steady walker can finish the 10K course in about three hours.)

Each registered walker who completes either course will receive an Olympic-like medal depicting the volksmarsch logo.

There's a pre-registration deadline of March 23; that assures successful walkers of receiving their medals on the very volksmarsch day. It's possible to register on volksmarsch day, but then there's a wait for the medal which will be sent later. To pre-register, call MMC Health Promotion coordinator Mary Eileen Kiniry, ext. 2974.

House, Marshall House, and the Patient Accounts offices in the Portland Glass building.

• Housekeepers work everywhere in the hospital, including Operating and Recovery Rooms, Special Care Units, Nurseries, Medical and Surgical Units, Emergency, offices, lobbies, and corridors.

• They do wash windows. And walls, ceilings, and furniture. They vacuum, spot, and shampoo carpets; they dry mop, damp mop, spray buff, and refinish floors.

• They remove trash -- more precisely, they remove three and a half tons a day; to do that, they use about 1,440,000 plastic trash bags a year.

One series of slides showed housekeeper Mary Queen at work in a patient room. Her procedures included highdusting (moldings, door tops, TV sets, etc.); damp dusting patient furniture and such "people contact" places as door knobs, light switches and telephones; bathroom cleaning; floor dusting; and damp mopping with disinfectant. It's a procedure she repeats over 3,000 times a year, Swan said. Not every room or office or square foot gets the total treatment every day, he said, but on a typical day the housekeeping department cleans 250 patient rooms, 300 offices, 122 procedure and examining rooms, and two miles of corridors.

The statistics are impressive, but Swan said: "I can't overemphasize the importance of these dedicated people" who make up the Housekeeping Department.


"We have two basic responsibilities: to maintain a clean and pleasant environment, and to help maintain infection control, and we accomplish these every day," he said, noting that housekeeping techniques, equipment and chemicals are all selected according to the requirements of the Hospital Infection Control Program.

And let's not forget washing and making beds: Housekeeping alone changes 80 to 100 beds per day as the patient population changes. Where do we get the linen for all this? For that story, Mike Swan turned the program over to Ken Davis.
