JCAH team to visit MMC next week

A Joint Commission on the Accreditation of Hospitals survey team will visit Maine Medical Center on January 9, 10, 11 and 12. The purpose of the survey is to determine whether the hospital is in compliance with nationally established standards of quality and performance in patient care and will therefore retain its accreditation.

MMC has been JCAH accredited since 1954. Seeking accreditation is a voluntary process reflecting a hospital's commitment to continuing evaluation and improvement of its performance in all areas of patient care. The JCAH is a private, non-profit organization created by and made up of health care professionals. Formed in 1951, it is governed by representatives of the

American College of Surgeons, the American College of Physicians, the American Dental Association and the American Medical Association.

The idea of voluntary accreditation — recognition of the need to evaluate and improve the care of hospital patients — dates back to 1913 when the American College of Surgeons organized a program of standardization. JCAH is an outgrowth of that organization and currently has accreditation programs for hospitals, long-term care facilities, psychiatric facilities and ambulatory health care programs.

The JCAH survey team will include a physician, a nurse and a hospital administrator. They will apply a check list of standards to as many as 24 areas in some departments. After surveying and evaluating MMC, the team will consult with personnel in all departments surveyed.

A perfect compliance score is rarely possible; hospitals must comply substantially, however, and indicate a willingness to work toward compliance in all areas.

Weight loss classes start this month

At the first session, participants will set individual weight loss goals, and following sessions will discuss nutrition and exercise plans.

The \$40 fee covers some of the costs of the program. Participants who meet their weight loss goals will be eligible for a 50% rebate when they complete the program.





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'Tis the season to know the storm policy

The MMC Personnel Department has issued a Storm Policy governing pay practices during periods of weather severe enough to create unsafe conditions going to or from work:

• The Executive Vice President will be responsible for declaring use of the Storm Policy.

• Employees are expected to make every reasonable effort to report to work as usual since patient care requirements continue despite weather conditions.

• Employees who are unable to get to work due to the storm should notify their supervisor as far in advance as possible. When such absences occur, employees may take an excused absence without pay or use accrued vacation or holiday time with approval from their supervisor.

• Employees who arrive late, due to the storm conditions, will be paid for their full regularly-scheduled shift.

• Employees who are sent home, due to storm conditions, by the department head, will be paid for their full regularly-scheduled shift.

Normal MMC pay practices apply to those employees asked to work beyond their scheduled shift to cover for late employees, just as for any other reason.

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It is easy to get a second car stickered

In order to get better control of the number of stickers out, Parking sent only one to each parker. The form is also used to change from payroll deduction to hourly or vice versa.

And remember, stickers must be in place on the lower left corner of your windshield by January 31, 1984.
