Survey results show interest in health

The results of the Health Promotion Interest Survey are in! 1,825 employees -- nearly 55% of the MMC workforce -- responded to the survey, which was designed to determine the level of interest in employee health promotion activities at MMC. The size and nature of the response indicates the interest is "healthy," to say the least.

The tabulated results would be too complicated to include here, but the highlights are:

- 1,825 employees responded, including 1,192 from the first shift, 310 from the second shift, 67 from the third shift, and 256 who didn't indicate a specific shift. The responses of the three shifts and the unidentified shifts were remarkably similar, so they've been averaged for this report.

● The following percentages of employees indicated an interest in certain employer-sponsored programs (multiple replies were possible):

JOG 25.5% WALK 34%
BIKE 31.5% AEROBIC DANCE 43%
RACQUETBALL 29.5% SWIM 47%
TENNIS 21% NO INTEREST 9%

● 59.5% of those responding indicated they were overweight.

● Of those who felt they were overweight, 71.5% said they would participate in a nutrition/weight reduction program.

● 76.5% of those who smoke said they would participate in a quit-smoking program.

● 47% indicated an interest in a Stress Management program, 64% in Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation training, and 58% in First Aid training.

● Interest was also expressed in lunch-and-learn lectures on various topics.

● Most people, regardless of shift, chose after work as the best time for exercise and training programs.

The survey was not a scientific measurement, and should not be taken as such. However, the big picture is clear: there is overwhelming interest in developing employee health promotion programs at MMC. A detailed analysis of the survey may be examined in the Personnel Office, and more details of the response will be coming soon.

In response to the positive reaction the survey received, the employee health promotion committee is gearing up for action. To keep everyone informed on the progress of program development and to allow for as much individual input as possible, an employee health promotion newsletter is on its way.

Photo contest makes the shutters flutter

Now is the time to start readying your photographs for entry in the 1983 Maine Medical Center Employee Photo Contest. With a choice of six categories and no limit on the number of entries, there's plenty of room for everyone. And while there's no entry fee, there may be prizes for the best photos (more on that later).

Official contest rules are posted on the bulletin board beside the *What's Happening* drop box near the ground floor Richards elevators. Here is a quick summary: The contest is open to full and part time employees, volunteers, and members of the medical staff. There are six categories: people, animals, scenic, color open, black and white open, and snapshot. You may enter as many photos as you like in as many categories as you like. Slides are not acceptable, and prints should be unframed, and preferably unmounted. The deadline for entry is May 13 -- drop entries at the Public Information Office. Each photo *must* have name, department, telephone extension, and category on the *back* of the print (no information on the front).

There's a category for every photo. Shots of people go in that category, and likewise with animals and scenery. The Color Open category has been included this year to provide a place for color photographs that don't quite fit anywhere else. Landscapes obviously go in Scenic, for instance, but what do you do with a boat, an architectural detail, or a shot that makes use of patterns or reflections? That is the kind of shot for which Color Open was designed.

The Black and White Open category will pit all black and white photos against each other. You're free to enter a black and white shot of a person, animal, or scenery in the other categories, of course, but remember that the competition will be in color.

The snapshot category is intended to provide a place for the products of Polaroids, Instamatics, and other

cameras wielded by casual picture-takers. Almost all of us own some sort of camera, and the Snapshot category allows for snapshots to be judged against their peers. This category has consistently produced some very interesting -- and very good -- photographs. You may, of course, enter a snapshot in one of the other categories, but bear in mind that most of the other entries in those categories will be enlargements, and most of them taken by 35mm or larger cameras. Of course, snapshots right off the roll have won in the past, so the decision is yours.

So, there's something for everyone in the 1983 Photo Contest. From casual shutterbugs to ardent camera buffs, from black and white enthusiasts to those who worry about color balance, you all have a reason to enter. And whether you've shot a beautiful scenic vista, a speeding train, a cute child, or anything else at all, there's an appropriate category.
