New system throws new light on classrooms

Classrooms 3 & 4 are sporting a new audiovisual system these days, the result of requests from users, design work by Audio/Visual Resources, construction work by Carpentry, Clinical Engineering, and the Electrical Shop, and funding from the MMC Annual Fund and the Maurice Moulton Fund. Once users become familiar with the new system, A/V Director Carole Duncan says, "it should greatly enhance the educational sessions in the rooms and make things much easier for presenters."

The system replaces the limited and somewhat cumbersome setup of the past with one that allows the following:

- use of a single slide projector
- use of two projectors for showing side-by-side images
- use of two projectors for dissolve effects
- use of a 16mm film projector
- control of the above, and the sound system as well, from a new lectern at the front of the room
- control of the room's overhead lights from wall-mounted switches behind the lectern
- use of either a wired or wireless microphone

Duncan says the primary impetus for the change came from surgeons and other staff physicians. Many users have lamented the lack of flexibility in the old system, but the surgeons in particular saw great benefit in being able to show two slides at once for comparison purposes, and in being able to dissolve from a "before" to an "after" view.

While designing in that capability, A/V took care of other problems as well. With the old system, presenters had to walk from the lectern to the projection block to start their slides, or have someone nearby to do it for **SYSTEM**, page 4

The tours, half an hour each, will be on the following schedule: TUESDAY, APRIL 12



Well-automated section responsible for study of hematologic disease such as anemias and leukemias, including special blood and bone marrow tests; routine CBCs; coagulation screens for bleeding disorders and assistance in management of people with diagnosed bleeding disorders; management of anticoagulant therapy, contributing to rehabilitation of cardiac patients.

- Noon OPD/Phlebotomy/Sorting: Maintains communications with departments both within the hospital and externally; phlebotomists are liaison between nursing units and Lab staff, also serving out-patients and clinic patients; staff perform lontophoresis test to assist physicians with early detection of Cystic Fibrosis.
- 1 PM Microbiology/Serology: Area crucial to complete medical care, constantly challenged to isolate and identify infectious bacteria and viruses including the most recently recognized pathogens such as Legionella and Herpes.
- 2 PM Endocrinology: A composite clinical and laboratory division devoted to clinical care of patients with Endocrine and metabolic disorders; performs Radioimmunoassay and other tests to diagnose dysfunction of the pituitary, adrenal, pancreas and thyroid glands and the gonads.

- 11 AM-Blood Bank: Performs many tests to insure safe, effective blood and blood component transfusions to MMC's patient population; Pheresis and therapeutic phlebotomy aid in treatment of various disease states. Since December, '82, administering blood in the Blood Bank has freed up space in ASU and allowed patients to be transfused on out-patient basis.
- Noon-Clinical Chemistry: Displays some of the most sophisticated technology in the field today; offers wide variety of procedures playing major role in prevention, detection and diagnosis of organic disease states; Estrogen Receptor Assay, as performed here, is unique in Maine.

be available in matter of hours, speeding up diagnostic process. Cytogenetics: Specializing in inherited diseases, performs genetic studies on families, rules out chromosomal abnormalities in spontaneous abortions and assists in early detection of leukemias.

• 2 PM - Immunology: Involved with study of lymphocytes and proteins

whose functions are to protect body from disease; also classifies certain cancers to render more effective radiation treatment.

Exhibits will be on display and refreshments served in the Lab Tuesday and Wednesday from 9 AM to 3 PM. There will also be exhibits set up at various locations in the hospital.

them. Similarly, side-by-side and dissolve projections had to be either programmed beforehand or carefully wired from the block to the lectern. Now, all the components of the system, from a single slide or film projector to a two-projector dissolve presentation, can be set up ahead of time and then operated with ease entirely from the lectern.

Room lights used to be controllable only from wall switches near the doors of the classrooms, but now the speaker need only turn around to find a switch. And the lectern itself is not only much more attractive than the old one, and wired for all these uses, but has two small lamps on flexible necks to enable the speaker to see notes even while running a slide show. The final touch in the new system is the wireless microphone, which frees the speaker to move about without being encumbered by a cord.

Duncan says the system is a model of how effectively and economically needs can be answered using only inhouse specialists. "Carpentry produced an ingenious cabinet specifically designed for the purpose," she says, "and at a tremendous savings over commercial systems." Similarly, the needed expertise in electronics came from Clinical Engineering, in electrical requirements from the Electrical Shop, and in audiovisual equipment from A/V itself.

Access to and rules for use of the new system are the same as before --but because the systems will be a bit more complicated for first-timers, A/V Resources advises prospective users to allow some time to have the system explained. A/V personnel are available as before for assistance as needed, both for help with the mechanics of the system and for advice on how to use the system to best advantage.
