InstaCard banking opens on Tuesday

Tuesday is "opening day" for the automatic teller machine at Maine Medical Center. The machine, known as InstaCard, will begin offering 24-hour banking services to MMC employees, patients and visitors following a brief opening ceremony with hospital and bank officials at 9 AM on Tuesday.

The banking center, located in the Richards wing on the spot where the inner doors led to the retired Orthopedic Entrance, will be open 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. During the first few days of operation, a hostess will be at the banking center to explain the workings of InstaCard and the automatic teller machine.

Energy management at MMC is a complex task

Managing the use of energy at Maine Medical Center is a sizable challenge, but the task is made easier by the Delta 1000, a versatile computer located in Operational Maintenance. The Delta monitors air temperatures and other environmental factors throughout the MMC complex, allowing Operational Maintenance to make corrections through the computer or dispatch a Building Service Operator (BSO) to make adjustments.

By keeping track of temperatures at a central location, the use of heating or air conditioning can be kept to a minimum. Supervisor of Operational Maintenance Gary Sacco explains that while a thermostat can keep the temperature in a given room fairly

constant, it isn't always enough. "Having a lot of people and equipment in a room can heat it beyond an acceptable level," he notes, "and people leaving offices at night, for instance, don't always turn the temperature down."

A temperature which varies from the acceptable range shows up on the Delta's printout, and if the adjustment cannot be made from there, the BSO can go to the location. A dramatic rise or fall in temperature would trigger an alarm for even faster response. The appropriate temperature ranges are determined by the type of space -patient care, office, lounge -- and by the time of day (lower office temperatures at night, and often during the day in busy areas).

Temperature is only one of the things monitored by the Delta. There are also sensors for relative humidity, a critical factor in areas with certain equipment and a comfort factor in most other areas. The Delta operator also knows which ventilation fans and central air conditioners are on or off, what the temperatures of hot water supplies or air conditioner discharges are, and which water pumps are on. The computer is programmed to automatically shut down about 100 amps of electrical service, mostly ventilation fans, between 10 AM and 5 PM, which according to Sacco is a substantial savings.

The Delta was originally installed for the hospital's fire alarm system, and that is still a primary function. When a fire alarm is pulled, the location registers at the MMC switchboard and also in Operational Maintenance and on another Delta unit at the Portland Fire Department. The computer automatically shuts down all ventilation fans and air conditioning units in the area, and also releases electromagnetic holders so fire doors will close.

The alarm in the Delta sounds if water or steam pressure changes too

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much, if the pressure in the oxygen supply system drops, if the surgical vacuum pressure drops, if a fire sprinkler valve is tampered with or damaged, and even if the sump pump in the McGeachey Hall elevator shaft comes on. A larger computer system, with more and expanded capacity, is planned for installation in connection with the new wing.

Automatic controls also help conserve heating energy in the Maine General Building, which is difficult to heat and cool effectively due to its age. A Torr-Anderson clock monitors the air temperature outdoors and controls the amount of steam circulating in the MGB radiators accordingly. At 60°F outdoors, there is no steam, and at 0° there is five pounds circulating constantly. At temperatures in between, that five pounds of steam is on for varying amounts of time each hour (30 minutes at 30°, 15 minutes at 45°, etc.). A manual override is provided for circumstances beyond design conditions.

Despite its sophistication, automatic equipment cannot replace trained people. MMC's four boilers are constantly watched by a licensed Boiler Operator, of which there are four on Gary Sacco's staff. There are five licensed Building Service Operators, at least one of whom is always on duty, and who all have knowledge in a number of areas, including boilers, mechanical, electrical, and clinical areas for trouble shooting.

Two utility men, who help the BSOs and Boiler Operators, and a full-time and part-time Delta Computer Operator round out the Operational Maintenance team.

As far as Gary Sacco is concerned, water is also part of MMC's energy picture. Considering its necessity to air conditioning, heating, sterilizing, and the overall running of a hospital -and its considerable cost -- water deserves that attention. MMC used 8.226.000 cubic feet of water in 1982 (in the main complex), at a cost of \$29,309. Getting rid of that water cost more than three and one half times that amount, at \$111,423. Sacco says sewer fees have gone from \$1.12 to \$1.55 per hundred cubic feet in the past year, and it now costs four times as much to dispose of water as it does to purchase it in the first place.

Last year, Operational Maintenance found a way to reduce the burden of sewer costs. Sewer fees are calculated on the basis of how much water comes in, on the assumption that what comes in will eventually go down the drain. However, there is some loss of water at MMC through steam that escapes from the heating system or from the cooling towers of the central air conditioning systems. A way was found to measure the loss, and that amount is now deducted from the cubic footage on which our sewer fee is based. Sacco acknowledges that the savings are small in comparison to the overall bill -- last August the savings were over \$800, leaving a bill of just over \$11,000 -- but he points out that every bit helps.

And that small but important innovation is an example of just how carefully energy use at MMC is monitored, and of the lengths to which Engineering will go to conserve energy and trim the energy bill.

All banking centers offer the same conveniences: check cashing, deposits and withdrawals (from either checking, NOW, share draft or statement savings accounts), and loan payments, too. All that's necessary to take advantage of the banking center is an InstaCard from any participating bank, savings and loan association or credit union (see Feb. 9 What's Happening for listing).
