# Clinical pastoral care program is in session

An extended unit of Maine Medical Center's Clinical Pastoral Education program is underway again this year with five participants. The program, under the guidance of Director of Chaplaincy Services Rev. John Simpson, D. Min., is the equivalent of the hospital's summer chaplaincy training program. It is less intensive than the summer program, but of longer duration, Chaplain Simpson explains, with the participants spending two full days a week in the hospital, September through May.

Under Chaplain Simpson's supervision, participants work on various units in the hospital, providing pastoral care to patients and consulting with health care professionals as they learn the spiritual aspects of patient care.

## Medical staff starts \$2 million campaign

Under the leadership of Chairman John F. Gibbons, M.D., Chief of Radiology, over 50 MMC physicians officially kicked off their Medical Staff Capital Campaign, "To Meet the Need," Monday evening. Dr. Gibbons and other physician volunteers have been organizing and preparing for the general solicitation of the Medical Staff since late September. They have set a goal of \$2,000,000 and plan to complete their efforts before the public campaign in 1983.

"We are very pleased and optimistic at this point," Dr. Gibbons told the physician volunteers. "The early commitments made by the Steering Committee members and other involved physicians are exemplary. If other physicians pledge proportionately as CAMPAIGN, page 3

## UVM/MMC relationship called mutual success

The clinical affiliation between Maine Medical Center and the University of Vermont College of Medicine is over two years old, and going strong. MMC Associate Vice President for Health Education Costas T. Lambrew, M.D., says it has been generally "an excellent relationship, one that has benefited both parties. We're getting mature, responsible people, and the students enjoy and profit from their time here."

The affiliation, which began in July 1980, places up to 21 third-year students at a time at MMC for clinical core rotations in five departments -- Medicine, Surgery, Obstetrics/Gynecology, Psychiatry, and Pediatrics. At the same time, fourth-year students come here for senior electives. There are ninety fourth-year medical students at MMC during the course of a year, from Vermont and other schools.

Their role at MMC requires the Vermont students to work closely with the attending medical staff, the house staff, nursing personnel, and allied health professionals. Those people, according to Dr. Lambrew, have been overwhelmingly positive in their comments. As part of their training, the students assist in taking histories, giving physical examinations, and other duties, under direct supervision.

MMC developed the affiliation with the University of Vermont three years ago, after reevaluating its affiliation with Tufts University School of Medicine. The MMC Medical Staff considered three options -- Tufts, Dartmouth Medical School, and Vermont -- and after an in-depth review recommended Vermont.

"The affiliation is important to Vermont," says Dr. Lambrew, "because it allows them to increase their enrollment as well as enhance their curroulum." He explains that the clinical programs

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here are complimentary to those at the Medical Center Hospital at Vermont, in some cases offering a greater breadth of experience. Many MMC physicians hold faculty appointments at Vermont. These are uncompensated positions, but offer physicians challenge, satisfaction, and recognition in their fields.

MMC benefits from the affiliation, Dr. Lambrew says, "because of the educational atmosphere that is generated by the presence of students. The 'goldfish bowl' effect is always beneficial to the quality of care in a hospital, due to the stimulation of peer challenge." Young doctors looking for a hospital in which to take their residency training place great importance on the presence of students, he says, and the challenges of a teaching hospital attract the best of both residents and attending medical staff.

The State of Maine has for some time had a "capitation" agreement with Vermont, under which Maine -- which has no allopathic medical school within its borders -- pays Vermont to reserve seats for qualified Maine citi-

zens at the University of Vermont College of Medicine. Dr. Lambrew says the clinical affiliation with MMC brings some of those monies back to Maine. This in turn strengthens the education programs for students, house staff, and attending staff here.

The strength of the UVM/MMC affiliation is typified by the arrangements made by the institutions for housing the students. MMC made one of its buildings, the Chisholm House, available for student housing, and the University of Vermont, in turn, spent about \$100,000 completely renovating the building.

MMC and University of Vermont officials have been meeting over the past month to review the affiliation and explore new directions. Among the topics of discussion for the future, Dr. Lambrew reports, is the offering of joint residencies at the senior level. In any event, he expects the affiliation to continue to grow in importance.
