United Way time means people helping people

The United Way campaign for 1982 is under way at Maine Medical Center, as it is across the country. Nationwide, more than 2,000 UW organizations, staffed by hundreds of thousands of volunteers are at work. 
"Now through this United Way campaign, the community is calling upon us to do the very best we can. I know we'll do it... because we always do."

Pediatric Crisis topic for critical care RNs

Common causes of cardiac arrest, electrical dosage for defibrillation, coping behavior of parents, components of psychological assessment... these and more are subjects for *Pediatric Crisis – What to Do*, a workshop sponsored by the Southern Maine Chapter of the American Association of Critical Care Nurses. The program, Friday, November 5 at the South Portland Sheraton Inn, is designed to increase the professional nurse's knowledge in the assessment and management of the pediatric patient in crisis.

Maine Medical Center is represented on the faculty by: Walter C. Allan, M.D., adult and pediatric neurologist; Michael R. Curci, M.D., pediatric surgeon; Ann M. McPhee, RN, Special Care Unit staff nurse; and Susan C. Porth, RN, IICU assistant head nurse. Physical therapists plan week of events

The Maine Chapter of the American Physical Therapy Association (MCAPTA) will convene in Portland November 6 and 7 for its Fall meeting. In recognition of this event and the important role of the physical therapists in the health care of Maine people, Governor Joseph Brennan has proclaimed November 1-7 as "Physical Therapy Week" in Maine. Physical therapists at MMC and elsewhere in the state will observe the week with a variety of events.

The 1982 Fall meeting of the MCAPTA is the 44th anniversary of the organization, which represents the physical therapy profession in Maine. The meeting will be highlighted by a clinical program on "Sensory Integrative Dysfunction," presented by professional faculty from the University of New England in Biddeford. Other activities include a business meeting and election of officers.

A number of MMC Physical Therapy staff members will be running in a 10 kilometer road race November 7 in Portland. The race is sponsored by the MCAPTA with the help of the Maine Track Club, and proceeds from entry fees will be donated to the Ronald McDonald House in Bangor. The MMC staff will be wearing specially-printed t-shirts bearing the hospital's name and the "To Meet the Need" logo of the MMC capital campaign. They hope to both promote aerobic exercise and show support for the capital campaign.

At MMC, the Physical Therapy Division of the Department of Medical Rehabilitation is planning an open house Thursday, November 4, from 8 AM to 9 AM and 3 PM to 4 PM. The clinic area in the Maine General building (3rd floor) and the gym on R4 will be open for visits from physicians, employees, and other interested persons. PT staff will be available to answer questions, and refreshments will be served.

The licensed professional PT staff at MMC is an integral part of the rehabilitation team process, according to Director Allen Wicken, RPT. "As part of today's total health care team," he explains, "physical therapists work in a variety of areas including the prevention of pain and disability, the restoration of impaired movements and activities, the promotion of healing, the relief of pain, and in teaching adaptation to permanent disability."
