Users, doers look at **Materials Management**

A massive study is underway in Maine Medical Center's Materials Management Department, involving the efforts of over thirty people known collectively as the Materials Management Study Committee. The study is aimed at improving the operations and service of the department, which over the five years of its existence has experienced a dramatic increase in demand and is facing even greater pressures due to MMC's proposed expansion. The principle underlying the entire study is one of assuring user satisfaction and customer service.

The process being used by the committee is based on a simple premise -that the people working in Materials Management and the people who are served by that department know what is needed and what can be done. Accordingly, subcommittees including personnel from Materials Management and user departments will tackle the study's broad objectives, which

1) to determine safe stock levels of critical items; 2) to investigate improved systems for the charging of patient supplies; 3) to centralize distribution of supplies (CSD and Storeroom); and 4) to investigate the economies of bulk purchasing.

The Materials Management study is important in light of expansion plans for MMC, and the method being used mirrors that found throughout the hospital's facilities planning process. Emplovees have been involved in the planning process in their areas of expertise, such as in the planning for SCU IV, which drew on the knowledge, skills, and experience of the physicians, nurses, and others who work in critical care.

Five subcommittees are at work, each co-chaired by Materials Manage-

ment personnel and consisting of volunteers from user departments. The Materials Management staff will do the bulk of the work, with input from users. Subcommittees are: Patient Charge System, chaired by Rick Dambrie and Jerry Gaskins; Bulk Purchases, chaired by Rita Nielsen and Heidi Pelletier; Critical Item List, chaired by Jeri Mundi and Carol Rairdon; Consolidation of CSD and Storeroom, chaired by Joe Fraser and Karen Bowen; and Supplies Distribution System, chaired by Charles Dibble and Greg Gelinas.

As these subcommittees complete their work, the results can be used to address the question of off-site warehousing. An off-site warehouse will be a necessity during construction and once the new building is completed, and the data compiled by the entire Materials Management Study Committee will be necessary to make the best decisions about such matters as location, size, and layout.

SMACH plans another COPD seminar June 25

The Southern Maine Association of Cooperating Hospitals (SMACH) and the Maine Lung Association have planned a follow-up to their well-attended May 28 seminars on Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease. A workshop on Pulmonary Rehabilitation Skills for Nurses and Therapists is scheduled for Friday, June 25, at the Kimball Health Center in Saco.

This day-long workshop will provide much more detailed information than the initial seminars, and focus on the skills and knowledge required for effective pulmonary rehabilitation. The morning session will consist of lectures, the afternoon of skills-building workshops.

Faculty for the workshop includes Teresa Getchell, RN, MA, a pulmonary nurse clinician at Mercy Hospital, Christine Hanscome, RN, a respiratory nurse specialist at Maine Medical Center, and Lee Goulet, RPT, a physical therapist at Mercy Hospital.

Topics to be covered include the assessment and evaluation of patients, the design and implementation of a rehabilitation program, and the evaluation of results.

There is no charge for the workshop, and lunch is available at \$4.00. The workshop has been submitted to the MSNA for 6 CEUs. To register, call the SMACH office at 283-0126 no later than today, June 23.
