MMC Volunteers praised for dedicated service

More than 100 of Maine Medical Center's volunteers heard their service to the hospital praised as "immeasurable" and "extremely valuable" during the recent annual Volunteer Recognition Day. The ceremony was held to honor 106 men and women who have donated a total of 141,500 hours of their time to MMC. Individual service ranged from 100 to 11,000 hours, but as Audrey Gough, Director of Volunteer Services, noted, "Although we seem to emphasize the hours given by volunteers, we also are recognizing quality of achievement and the service they represent."

Guest speaker Pamela P. Plumb, who described her current position as mayor of Portland as that of a "professional volunteer," said there appears to be a resurgence in volunteerism, partly due to cutbacks in government services and the new direction of the women's movement which "allows a woman to do what she chooses to do and feel proud of it."

But most importantly, Mrs. Plumb

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said, there is a "new understanding" of volunteerism -- she describes it as "having to give something of value to someone in the community." That, in turn, will help to make more people aware of what volunteers do, she added.

"The more we take our volunteers seriously, the more the community will do the same," she emphasized. "And being a volunteer is serious work."

Over the last 25 years, the role of volunteers began to diminish as the government stepped in with more programs and money to help needy persons and institutions, Mrs. Plumb said. As a result, those who donated their time to various causes started to feel unwanted and the word "volunteer" became distorted, she said. It lumped those volunteers into the category of "all those women who were cookiepushers at parties." The women's movement, in its infancy, also tended to devalue work that was given for free. But Mrs. Plumb happily noted that that mood is changing now.

The drawing is scheduled for 7:30 AM to 4:30 PM in Classrooms 3 and 4. For those who forget to sign up in advance, there is always room for the drop-in donor on drawing day.

Deck the halls with holiday caution. . .

Decking the halls is standard, happy procedure for the holidays, and -- in a hospital setting such as ours -- certain precautions are part of the decorating procedure. For the safety of all MMC patients, visitors and employees, Executive Vice President and Treasurer Donald L. McDowell passes on the following guidelines:

- Evergreen trees or live greens, in any form, cannot be permitted in hospital property.
- Electric lights or electrified ornaments cannot be allowed.
- Decorative materials, such as tinsel, posters, hanging items, etc., cannot be used if they are easily ignited (flammable crepe paper, for instance). Tinsel and artificial trees must be of the fire retardant and self-extinguishing type.
- Materials should not be placed so that they impede traffic or jeopardize personnel/patient safety (for instance, if hanging material could catch on an IV pole or strike a person's face or eyes).
- The glass in fire hose cabinets and vision panels in doors may not be covered. As always, discretion should be used in the manner in which material is attached to painted surfaces so that the tape does not remove the paint.

These policies apply to all parts all hospital buildings. Any questions should be directed to Jim Fraser, Fire and Safety Officer, at ext. 2513 or RP 641.

At MMC, Mrs. Plumb called volunteer work "extremely valuable" to the hospital staff, "whether there is a paycheck or boutonniere attached to it."

Edward C. Andrews, Jr., M.D., president of MMC, told the volunteers their roles at the hospital are "very important in getting our job done." He noted that 2,000 hours of volunteer service is equal to a person's 40-hour work week over one year. "That's a significant economic impact on this institution," he said, adding that the real contribution is "what you do for the morale of the patients and those who work here. It is immeasurable."

MMC volunteers perform a number of services for patients and staff, from manning the Coffee Shop and Flower Box, sorting patient mail, delivering flowers, conducting patient surveys, to working on nursing units such as Cardiology and in clerical positions.

As a tradition during the Volunteer Recognition Day, those persons who have reached the 500-hour mark are presented paperweights bearing the MMC medallion.
