## Clinics try to get patients "buckled up"

A car safety seat is as "integral and important to the health and well being of a child as immunization against disease," and the major cause of death in children -- auto accidents -- is the target of a new program in Maine Medical Center's Prenatal and Pediatric Clinics. Through a generous grant from the Visiting Board of the Children's Hospital, approved infant carriers are now available to eligible families who are clinic patients. The only cost is a small refundable deposit.

Organizers of the program see it as a logical extension of the care provided in the clinics. Patients in the Prenatal Clinic are exposed to the concept of car safety early in the sessions, so that by the time their baby is born and ready to go home, parents have had a chance to obtain a seat. Maternity patients are urged to watch "Car Safety -- Don't Risk Your Child's Life" on Channel 2, MMC's closed circuit patient education channel, and patients in the Pediatric Clinic are also exposed to car seat education efforts.

At stake in the educational effort here at MMC and nationwide are the lives of nearly 4,000 children every year. That many are killed in automobile accidents annually, and another 100,000 require hospitalization for injuries, according to the American Academy of Pediatrics. The auto accident is responsible for more deaths of children between the ages of one and fourteen than any other accident or disease, says the National Safety Council, while the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration estimates the use of car seats can reduce deaths by 90% and injuries by 80%.

According to all available figures, the non-use of child car seats is widespread. It is estimated that nearly half of all infants traveling in the front SEATS, page 2

seats of automobiles are in the lap of an adult, instead of a car seat, and that 40 percent of the children killed in car crashes each year are riding in the back seat, unrestrained. Organizers of MMC's program would like to see every baby born here leave the hospital in a proper car seat and every young patient come and go in one.

Professionals here and elsewhere rely on the documented, frightening facts to sell parents on the idea of car seats. Most adults feel they are perfectly capable of holding a baby safely on their laps, but here are the sobering details of a head-on collision at only 20 miles per hour with a baby being held by its mother: The forward inertia of the impact gives a 15-pound infant an effective weight of 300 pounds, so the baby is torn from its mother's arms and hurled against the dashboard. The mother's 115 pound body, which now weighs over 2,000 pounds, is on

the same trajectory, with obvious results.

The word used to describe deaths by automobile accidents is "preventable," and engaged in the effort to prevent those deaths is a variety of professionals and volunteers. At MMC, the educational effort involves nurses, attending physicians, resident physicians, and others. Eligible patients wishing to take part in the program are instructed in the use of the seats and then referred to Woodfords Congregational Church where distribution of the seats is handled by volunteers.

Another group in Southern Maine -the Southern Maine Association for
Child Transportation Safety -- rents
car seats for a low monthly fee, without
regard to financial status. SMACTS is
composed of volunteers who purchase
the seats through fund raising activities and staff the program themselves.

The grant to finance MMC's car seat program is only the latest of many

projects undertaken by the Visiting Board of the Children's Hospital. The auxiliary group was founded in 1910 to aid the Children's Hospital, one of the parent institutions of the Maine Medical Center. They have, in recent years, completely refurbished the Pediatric Unit nursing station, the Playroom and the parent's waiting room, and more recently made a substantial contribution to the Maine Poison Control Center.

Fifteen months after its inception, the Maine Medical Center Carpool Project has 125 registrants. Those who have registered but have not yet received a match should not despair, because registrants are added regularly. As new people sign up, all names are reviewed for possible matches.

## Panel to focus on personal health care

"A Cycle of Personal Health Care" is the program topic of the Friends of Maine Medical Center annual meeting, Friday, October 9. The public is invited to attend.

Costas T. Lambrew, M.D., Associate Vice President for Health Affairs, and a panel of health care professionals will follow an individual from health, through illness, convalescence, and back to health. Discussion will deal with the cycle as if affects the patient and the patient's entire family as well. The emphasis will be on the importance of helping the individual to be an active advocate for his or her own health—and to become the primary person responsible for a higher quality of life through increased health awareness.

The meeting begins at 10 AM in classrooms 3 and 4 at the hospital. Coffee will be served at 9:30 AM.

Edward C. Andrews, Jr., M.D., President of MMC, will greet members and guests. Friends president Mrs. George W. Foley of Cape Elizabeth will direct the meeting. Program chairman is Mrs. Lyle Clevenger, also of Cape Elizabeth.

An auxiliary group established in 1959, the Friends assume responsibility for several Maine Medical Center programs including "Preview for Parents," a program held for approximately 165 expectant mothers and fathers each month to acquaint them with the hospital and staff involved in caring for their new baby. Friends also staff the four Red Cross Bloodmobile drives held each year in the hospital, and they provide more than 3,000 "Friendly Dragon" hand puppets given annually to young pediatric patients.
