Budget review goes deeper than money

The Maine Medical Center budget, both operating and capital, is said to be the "ultimate policy statement of the institution." Through the funding of the various divisions and departments, decisions are made regarding the mission of the hospital, the level and type of patient care services, the number of employees to provide those services, and generally what happens and what doesn't.

That, according to Executive Vice President and Treasurer Donald L. McDowell, makes the budget and the budget process vitally important. He feels the current system of setting each department's budget by adjusting the previous year's figures to compensate for inflation, changes in services, and volume changes, does not adequately reflect the policy implications of the budget. What is needed in addition, he says, is a method to examine the "base," the foundation on which each successive budget is built.

The resolution of this difficulty is the Departmental Budget Review Process, a new program at MMC which will examine the budget base -- operations, services, and personnel -- of each department every three years or five years, depending on the size of the budget. There are three departments currently in review: Pharmacy, Housekeeping, and Laundry.

This baseline review of departmental budgets, says McDowell, will enable hospital administration and the individual department heads to study the operation of each department at a deeper level than is possible in the annual budgeting process. Factors included in the intensive reviews are: examinations of past volume projections vs. actual activity, pricing structures, record-keeping methods, interdepartmental relationships, and potential revenue sources, and analysis

of revenue vs. costs, staffing patterns, inventory control procedures, work flow, and use of computer support.

While the budget review process is born of financial concerns, McDowell says the benefits should include increased effectiveness and a better understanding of each department and the way it interacts with others. "If this were an assembly line," he says, "we could just walk down it and see how everything goes together. But here, we have hundreds of 'assembly lines' and thousands of interactions between departments and parts of **BUDGET**, page 2

According to figures published in the Guy Gannett Publishing Company's annual State of Maine edition June 27, Maine Medical Center is the state's third largest private employer. With nearly 3,000 employees, MMC comes in behind Bath Iron Works (6,300) and Great Northern Paper Company (4,200).

The second largest hospital employer in Maine is Eastern Maine Medical Center in Bangor, with 2,000, and Mid-Maine Medical Center in Waterville reports 1,200 employees.

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departments. Without detailed review, nobody can possibly understand the intricacies of the entire process."

A review of this scope is normally done by an outside consulting firm, according to McDowell. At MMC, however, in-house people are conducting the reviews and the individual department heads and division chiefs are deeply involved. McDowell feels the process will be a valuable experience for all involved, and the cost-saving potentials are significant. Along with the department head and a selected staff member, the review team includes the Administrator working with the department, a member of the Accounting staff, a representative from Personnel, an internal auditor, another department head (as a staff resource) and the one outside person brought in to assist with the review: a management engineer.

Management Engineer Don Beddie, with Group Systems Engineering Project, Inc., is an integral part of the review process. It is his task to take the statistical reports from the department, the financial reports from Accounting, the staffing and training reports from Personnel, the systems analyses from Internal Auditing, and the results of the various study team meetings, and with the committee produce from them a final report and recommendations.

Director of Pharmacy Robert Auger is nearing the end of his department's review, and reports he is pleased with the process. He feels the opportunity to examine the department in detail, apart from day-to-day problems, gives him a better understanding of the operation. "And," he adds, "everybody we interact with has the opportunity to learn what really goes on down here, and the result is a better understanding among departments."

Housekeeping Director Michael Swan also enjoys the better understanding he now has of his own department and others. "You always try to do the best job possible, and make the operation work well, and it's nice to have people from outside the department agree with you or offer suggestions for improvement."

McDowell says that the three reviews currently in progress have gone very well, particulary because the department heads involved are benefitting from the process and have been eager to get involved. A certain amount of paranoia might be expected with such an intensive review, but McDowell says so far it is at a healthy level. "We're not looking for problems," he points out, "just opportunities for improvement. Department heads would already be aware of problems; we want to examine potentials they might not realize exist."

The review process turns up interesting facts, too. Pharmacy Director Auger says it has been shown that without computer assistance, he would need three or four additional people in his IV operation alone. He estimates the computer saves him eight or more staff people in all, mostly in labeling.

The first three departments reviewed represent a contrast in operations. The Pharmacy is concerned primarily with a massive, expensive inventory, Housekeeping with a large staff, and Laundry with a large staff and a good deal of machinery. Other reviews will examine departments that deal mostly with patients, or mostly with paper, or mostly with machinery, but the purpose of the work will be the same: increased awareness, greater efficiency, and a "fine-tuned" budget for every operation in the hospital.


New offer to fuel discount program

Gasoline is now available through the Employee Activity Committee's Employee Discount Program, but the mechanics of the offer are more complicated than most. The *A. R. Wright Co.,* at 315 Park Avenue in Portland, has a 24-hour, 7-day automated selfservice filling station that dispenses both regular and unleaded gasoline and is operated by the insertion of a special plastic credit card.

The plan is a credit program, with a monthly statement to purchasers. In order to obtain a card, MMC employees must apply *directly* to A. R. Wright Co. for a credit account. The monthly statement contains the date, time, odometer reading, vehicle description, fuel type, and amount of each purchase.

For MMC employees, the discount will vary according to the number of approved credit accounts the company obtains from the hospital. If 1-99 employees receive accounts, the discount is 1¢ per gallon, 100-199 accounts would qualify us for 1½¢ off per gallon, and 200+ accounts would give MMC employees 2¢ off per gallon.

A survey by the EAC shows A.R. Wright's prices to be competitive with other self-service stations in the area, and the available discounts would place them below the others. Application for the program *must* be made *directly* to A: R. Wright Co. They are located at the intersection of St. John St. and Park Ave., and their phone number is 773-8171.


