# P3A scheduled for Yule renewal

The traditional Christmas-time renovations will take place this month on P3A. Edward W. Hollidge, administrative engineer, says Physical Plant crews will begin the job Saturday, Dec. 16. "We expect to have the unit back into full operation by Jan. 2," he said.

Each year during the holiday season, when the MMC census is expected to drop slightly, a nursing unit is closed long enough for hospital carpenters, plumbers, electricians and painters to do a complete fact lift.

Ceilings will be lowered, bathrooms will be renovated and corridor floors will be re-tiled to reduce the noise level.

When the Physical Plant workers complete their part of the renovation, House-keeping people will move in to wash windows, thoroughly clean the rooms, hang drapes and wax floors.

When patients and staff return in January they'll find a much brighter, cheerier atmosphere on the unit.

Brief presentations were made by representatives of several medical service departments with each speaker fielding questions from the audience.



# Cafeteria survey nets results: what you seek is what you get!

An October survey of MMC cafeteria customers shows they're happy with both food and service, Chef Steward John Romano said in a memo last week.

"The Food Service Department would like to thank those people who took time to comment and participate in our Cafeteria Survey," he said, adding that he was especially pleased to see comments like, "Best food I have ever had in a hospital," and "Food and personnel 100 percent plus."

Romano said that many items that were asked for soon will be available. The salad bar, he said, will be featuring low-calorie and oil and vinegar dressing, and a special "dressing of the day" which wll include Thousand Island, Russian, Sweet and Sour and Chef Specials. There will be a vegetable "special of the day" for sal-

ads, alternating celery, alfalfa sprouts, pickled beets, marinated beans, shredded carrots and other related items.

A self-service soup bar also is scheduled for the near future, with a selection of soups and crackers.

Other items available now or very soon include half-grapefruit, herbal teas, sour cream for baked potatoes, homemade cookies and bran, banana nut and cranberry muffins.

Feedback, says Romano, is always welcome.

"We are in the process of creating new menus," Romano said, "which will be posted a day in advance. Employees can help us decide which foods to include by leaving suggestions in the notebook located near the blackboard. We appreciate hearing from you."
