ADMINISTRATIVE SHIFTS

Two senior administrative shifts have been announced by MMC President Edward C. Andrews, Jr., M.D. They are effective today. Jack R. Dyson, treasurer, has been named Executive Vice President, and Philip K. Reiman has assumed a newly-created post as Vice President for External Management Services. In his new role, Mr. Reiman will tap a variety of management and operating expertise within Maine Medical Center in serving as consultant to other health services institutions in the area who may request assistance. Such a request has been received from the Rumford Hospital's Trustees and Mr. Reiman will be spending a substantial amount of time working with Rumford Hospital personnel in the months immediately ahead.

Responsibilities of MMC Vice President for Medical Affairs Douglass W. Walker, M.D., are unchanged. Like Vice Presidents Dyson and Reiman, he reports directly to President Andrews in carrying out his duties.

NICOLL APPOINTED

In another personnel move, President Andrews also has announced the appointment of a Coordinator of Planning for MMC to fill a staff vacancy created by the departure of Eugene E. Loubier last spring for a hospital administrative post in Massachusetts. The new appointee, who will assume his duties on December 1, is Donald E. Nicoll, currently chairman of the Joint Operations Committee of the Land Grant Universities of New England and former aide (1961-72) to Senator Edmund S. Muskie in Washington. Mr. Nicoll has served as consultant to the Ford Foundation, Energy Policy Project, Robert R. Nathan Associates, National Science Foundation, Roosevelt Campobello International Park Commission, and the Land Grant Universities of New England on long-range planning, institutional organization, public administration, federal-state relations, regional cooperation, and resources and environmental problems.

AN EMPLOYEE COUNCIL

In a letter Friday, President Andrews told MMC employees that he will join Personnel Director Charles E. Huff in aiding the formation of an elected employee council. He said he worked with such a council for four years at the University of Vermont, and that it improved communications and made employee input available to administration. Dr. Andrews said he first made the employee council suggestion during his July visit to MMC, and amplified it in the series of open meetings in September, shortly after he assumed his office here.

In the Friday letter, he told employees "we will welcome the opportunity to work with such a group on both the problems and the opportunities that mutually challenge us."

PROGRESS REPORT ON LOVATT FUND

Ethel I. Lovatt, R.N., assistant director of Nursing from 1965 to 1975, died on October 21, and since then many friends and associates have made gifts in her memory to the Lovatt Fund, which will be used to purchase books in the field of Nursing for the MMC Health Sciences Library. To date 66 gifts, ranging from \$1 to \$50 each, have been received, for a total of \$640.50, and more are coming in every day. UNITED HALF-WAY

Chairman Elsie Mead of the United Way Campaign said Friday that a total of 834 MMC people have pledged \$14,176.77, with a little over 1,000 cards still out. It's better than half-way to the MMC goal of \$25,000, but a long way, Mrs. Mead says, from the goal of 100 percent participation by the MMC employee group. She points out, however, that the 1,000 remaining cards, if returned, could put the drive over the top. That's what she hopes will happen this week, when an all-out effort will be made to contact the card-holders. The same kind of a drive is being conducted throughout the community to assure continued support of some 40 agencies.
