A YEAR OF WORK

A year of work by representatives of the Nursing department and Pharmacy, assisted by the Medical Staff and Administration, comes to fruition Tuesday with the first use of a new Doctors' Order system. Designed to improve the quality of patient care in several ways, use of the new forms begins at 12:01 a.m. Tuesday. Nursing personnel, physicians and pharmacists have been fully briefed on the new system which, among its other advantages, allows the Pharmacy to dispense medications in accordance with a direct copy of the physician's original order rather than from a charge ticket transcribed by a unit clerk. The new system, which presents far less chance for errors than the current method, also will allow greater accuracy in patient billing and other accounting procedures. The new system is regarded as a major step toward the eventual establishment of a unit dose method of dispensing medications.

SIGN UP NOW

Regional Blood Bank enrollment forms are being circulated throughout MMC this week for use by all MMC people. They're to be returned to the Public Relations department before Thursday, March 15. The names will constitute the MMC unit in files maintained by RBB, which will make appointments for blood donations here at the hospital on continuing, year-round basis. This way, it will be convenient for hospital people to join donors throughout the community and state in the RBB's efforts to meet the needs of some 26 major hospitals in Maine...including ours. No blood is purchased, and none is sold. It's free, with patients billed only for the processing charge. Enrollment means full coverage for employees and their immediate families, and each enrollee is asked to donate only once a year. And...if you're medically unqualified to donate, you're still covered.
