2,288 MAN-HOURS LOST

Administrative Engineer Don Bail reported last week that there were 209 reportable accidents at MMC in 1972, 30 of which required the employees--and the institution--to lose a total of 2,288 man-hours. The accident frequency was up to 9.7 lost-time accidents in every million man-hours from 5.5 in 1971. Most of the losttime accidents, he said, were needle punctures, cuts and back strains.
