ABOUT VACATIONS

Benefits over and above wages and salaries were outlined this week for all employees in a flyer distributed by the Personnel Department. Necessarily brief, the sheet described the current fringe package that costs MMC about \$1300 annually for the average hospital employee. Paid holidays and vacations are two of the items. There are nine paid holidays, and the amount of paid vacation time depends on length of hospital employment. A worker with one year gets two weeks; one with ten years gets three weeks; and one with 15 years gets four weeks. Vacations may be taken at any time of the year with the approval of the department head.

TAKING SHAPE

Metal framing for partitions, electrical wiring and other systems are pretty well along on the 8th floor of the Richards Wing, where workmen are constructing the new cardiovascular diagnostic center. This week, some of the work involved the outside of the building as window and wall changes were made.
