PLANNING GRANT AWARDED

A \$19,500 grant has been awarded to MMC by Maine's Regional Medical Program for preliminary studies of the ambulatory care program. The studies may lead to revision of the present clinic system to provide comprehensive care, and to the eventual development of a department of Community Medicine. As envisioned, the preliminary steps could include a pilot project providing total care for a number of Model Cities residents. The pilot or demonstration model could provide information of great value in the planning of the full-scale ambulatory care program at MMC.
