IT IS REQUESTED

The Patient Care Committee suggested, several weeks ago, that the old twovisitors-for-each-patient rule be re-emphasized, and that visitors and others be requested not to smoke in patient rooms. The suggestion met the approval of the Executive Committee of the Medical Staff last week. Plans call for signs in each room, but in the interim, cards bearing the message will be given to visitors at the information desks and nursing stations. The same policy will be implemented at Mercy and Osteo. Results should be better rest and clearer air for patients in all three Portland hospitals.

THE STRIPES ARE UP

A system of colored stripes to help guide hospital newcomers is being installed in the ground floor corridors. The first, which is orange, leads from the Bramhall lobby all the way to the Security identification office at the far west end of the General Building corridor. This one stripe will guide visitors and outpatients to some 23 separate offices, facilities and locations along the way, and of course to elevators which they'll take to reach many more. A second stripe--yellow -also starts in the Bramhall lobby and leads to the Richards elevators. There'll be one more, under present plans, to help patients to the clinic areas.

New signs and polite suggestions that hospital personnel ride the passenger elevators only, leaving the "patient and utility" elevators for stretchers, just haven't worked. Vertical people continue to use the "patient and utility" elevators, and last week, the OR schedule was out of kilter on more than one occasion when patients were delayed. <u>The rule will be enforced</u> in the near future to prevent these delays, and to insure that the stretcher cars are available whenever they're needed.
