18,000 USED LIBRARY LAST YEAR

Nearly 18,000 healthcare people -- physicians, nurses, technologists, pharmacists, social workers, dietitians, hospital administrators and students -- used the Maine Medical Center Library during the past year. The current holdings of this library -- which has been designated by the National Library of Medicine as the Resource Library for Maine -- include 8,000 monographs and texts, 6,400 bound journals and 480 current journal subscriptions.

"The medical library exists," explains Chief Librarian Eleanor C. Cairns, "to provide complete and up-to-date medical information for doctors, nurses and other hospital personnel for their continuing education and the improvement of patient care. All members of our library staff believe this and work towards this goal."

The requests for literature and data from professionals at MMC and elsewhere in the state are filled by a full-time staff of eight. During 1975 more than 500,000 photo copies of library materials were furnished on a one-day service basis. The staff also supplied nearly 500 literature searches and bibliographies through MEDLINE, the computerized medical information retrieval system.

The holdings of the National Library of Medicine and the Countway Library at Harvard University are easily available to any physician in Maine through the library's teletype service.

The library receives an infinite variety of requests for literature searches. Information may be needed by a doctor in Presque Isle who's preparing a talk on whooping cough; or a staff physician may want an update on chemotherapy for treatment of prostatic neoplasms, or a request may be received for the current findings on gold toxicity among patients with arthritis. Reference Librarian Jane Cooper finds this keeps her job interesting. "I especially enjoy working with the hospital's medical students and residents. It's satisfying to help them learn how to find the information they need."

"The hospital library is no longer a luxury," said Ms. Cairns, "it's a necessity if physicians, nurses and other healthcare professionals are to stay abreast of
